

IN BOARD OF SELECTMAN
WEDNESDAY, MARCH 28, 1979

Present: Chairman John E. Murray, Robert J. Hotch and William J. Cossart.

The statutory requirements as to notice having been fulfilled, the meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Chairman John E. Murray.

Utility Petitions: UP79-91 Pantry and Dakin Roads, UP79-92a,b,c Willis Road, and UP79-93 Landham Road

Present: Robert L. Blake, Boston Edison Company; and Joseph D. Bausk, New England Telephone and Telegraph Company.

In conformity with General Laws Chapter 166, Sections 21 and 22, the Board considered the following petitions:

1) Utility Petition 79-91, dated February 22, 1979, of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for permission to lay and maintain underground conduits and serving area cabinet with wires and cables to be placed therein, under the surface of the following public ways:

PANTRY ROAD AND DAKIN ROAD, westerly side from existing pole 31/31 approximately 143 feet south of North Road extending northerly along Pantry Road thence northeasterly across North Road thence northerly along Dakin Road thence north-westerly across Dakin Road approximately 385 feet of conduit and one (1) serving area cabinet.

2) Utility Petition 79-92a, dated February 14, 1979, of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for permission to locate a line of wires, cables, poles, and fixtures, including the necessary anchors, guys and other sustaining and protecting fixtures, along and across the following public way:

WILLIS ROAD, southeasterly side approximately 20 feet southwest of Ford Road
One (1) pole

and Utility Petition 79-92b, dated February 14, 1979, of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for permission to lay and maintain underground conduits and serving area cabinet with the wires and cables to be placed therein, under the surface of the following public way:

WILLIS ROAD, southeasterly side from existing pole 133/51 opposite Ford Road extending southwesterly approximately 49 feet of conduit and one (1) serving area cabinet

and Utility Petition 79-92c, dated February 15, 1979, of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for permission to lay and maintain underground conduits and serving area cabinet with the wires and cables to be placed therein, under the surface of the following public way:

WILLIS ROAD, southerly side from existing conduit approximately 5 feet east of Maynard Road approximately 20 feet of conduit and one (1) serving area cabinet.

3) Utility Petition 79-93, dated February 12, 1979, of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company and Boston Edison Company for joint or identical locations for the erection or construction of guy wire and anchor upon, along and across the following public way:

LANDHAM ROAD, easterly side, approximately 309 feet south of Boston Post Road One (1) Guy Wire and Anchor.

Executive Secretary Richard E. Thompson reported that all appropriate Town officials and abutters had been notified, and that the following reports from the Wiring Inspector Francis E. White, had been received: 1) dated March 15, 1979, relative to UP#79-91 recommending disapproval as the proposed petition is in conflict with the Town's accepted road layout (to lay cables on the west and south sides of roads) pertaining to electrical and telephone locations; and 2) dated March 15, 1979, relative to UP79-92a,b,c and UP79-93 recommending approval.

Addressing Mr. White's concern regarding uniformity of electrical installations along Town ways, Mr. Joseph D. Bausk of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company responded that UP#79-91 was merely a connection, not a conduit, to be connected to a serving area cabinet located on the northerly side of Dakin Road, which is a major junction so that it cannot be moved.

Following a brief discussion it was on motion by Selectman Robert J. Hotch unanimously

VOTED: To approve Utility Petition #79-91 Pantry and Dakin Roads, Utility Petition #79-92a,b,c Willis Road, and Utility Petition #79-93 Landham Road, all as described above and as shown on plans 6-79, dated February 22, 1979, 3-79, dated February 14, 1979, 4-79, dated February 14, 1979, 5-79, dated February 15, 1979, and plan drawn by C. B. Damrell dated January 26, 1979, respectively.

The Board noted in its decision on this petition, that it was not condoning exceptions to standard accepted road layouts pertaining to electrical and telephone locations, but approving an exception in this case because: 1) necessity of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company to cross over to reach its main service area cabinet for connection, and 2) to proceed otherwise would require large capital layout and delay of implementation of the petition to service area customers.

Organization of the Board

Following the nomination of John E. Murray by Selectman Robert J. Hotch, it was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To elect John E. Murray Chairman of the Board of Selectmen for the ensuing year.

Following the nomination of Richard E. Thompson by Chairman John E. Murray, it was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To elect Richard E. Thompson Clerk to the Board of Selectmen for the ensuing year.

School Fire Inspections

Present: Josiah F. Frost, Fire Chief.

Selectman Cossart asked about the results of the school inspections recently completed by the Fire Department, specifically relating to chained doors at the Lincoln-Sudbury Regional High School.

Fire Chief Josiah F. Frost stated a full inspection had been completed, and that because the Regional High School's inspection was completed during school vacation, he and Captain Michael Dunne have re-inspected on three separate occasions during regular school hours and in the evening, finding only one chained door on those three occasions. At the request of the Board, Chief Frost stated that he would forward a report on the recently completed school fire inspections to the Selectmen's Office.

In answer to Chairman Murray's question regarding mock front doors at the Regional High School, the Chief responded that fire regulations do not require two sets of double doors at the front entrance, that one set of operating double doors is sufficient.

Selectman Cossart stated that within the last week it had been called to his attention that the practice of chaining doors at the High School during regular school hours and during athletic events in gyms 2 and 3 is continuing; he expressed his concern of the situation, and the Board requested that the Chief personally look into the situation immediately.

Chairman Murray expressed his opinion that the doors are sometimes chained (during school hours and events) only for the convenience of the janitors.

Chief Frost stated that he will send his captains over each night for the next couple of weeks, and personally inspect during the daytime; Chief Frost stated that he had spoken to Mr. Richard Santella, Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds at the High School in the past, regarding the same, and will be in touch with him again, if necessary.

Following further discussion, on the recommendation of Selectman Cossart, the Board was in concurrence to send a letter to the Lincoln-Sudbury Regional High School Committee re-enforcing the Chief's position regarding the chaining of doors while the building is in use, and stating that it appears this practice still exists and the Selectmen are gravely concerned over the matter; a copy of the letter is to be forwarded to Mr. Levington and Mr. Santella.

Application of Underground Storage of Inflammables

Present: Josiah F. Frost, Fire Chief; Albert J. Zaccone, Technical Director, and Thomas Craig, General Manager, Coatings Engineering Corporation; Lawrence E. Gogolin, Board of Health.

Chairman John E. Murray convened a public hearing, under the provisions of Chapter 148 of the General Laws, on the application dated March 5, 1979 of Albert J. Zaccone, Technical Director of Coatings Engineering Corporation,

for a license to store underground 10,000 gallons of no-lead gasoline - Class A, on property located at 33 Union Avenue.

Executive Secretary Richard E. Thompson stated that all appropriate abutters and Town officials had been notified and referenced the following communications: 1) from the Building Inspector, Francis E. White, recommending approval with the stipulation that proper safety precautions would be taken relating to the wiring of the pump; 2) from the Fire Chief, dated March 19, 1979, indicating no objection to the issuance of a storage license; and 3) from the Conservation Commission, dated March 20, 1979, bringing the Board up-to-date on the Coatings case concerning the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) requirement for a waste-water treatment facility at Coatings.

Fire Chief Josiah F. Frost stated that installation of the pump will be checked by the Fire Department, and that tanks to accommodate up to 50,000 gallons have been in the ground for several years, (only one 10,000 gallon tank is empty).

Mr. Albert J. Zaccone, Technical Director of Coatings Engineering Corporation, asked if the location of the additional 10,000 gallons storage of no-lead gas, Class A, could be interchangeable with chemicals now being contained in another 10,000 gallon tank. The Board later concurred that, if the license for storage were granted, the location would have to be designated.

In answer to concerns expressed by Selectman Hotch and E. Lawrence Gogolin of the Board of Health, regarding the safety of the tanks which have been in the ground for several years, and the possible corrosion due to storage of chemicals in the past, Mr. Zaccone stated that the empty tank (located at the easterly end of the Coatings Building) will be pumped of all accumulated water, and that because the tank is fiberglass, there is no problem of rusting. Mr. Zaccone continued to say that no corrosive chemicals have been previously stored in the tanks, only solvents and plasticizers. Chief Frost confirmed he has no concern regarding the safety or leakage of the tanks since they were installed in 1969 or 1970.

The General Manager of Coatings, Thomas Craig, requested the use of tanks #1 and 2, having a storage capability of 10,000 gallons, to be used for the requested additional storage of no-lead gasoline, Class A, in accordance with the above-mentioned application, by transferring the chemicals now being stored there to the empty 10,000 gallon tank.

Selectman Cossart referenced the above-mentioned communication from the Conservation Commission indicating a lack of cooperation in the past by Coatings to comply with concerns expressed by the Board of Health and the Conservation Commission regarding their illegal discharge of waste water, which has continued for several years, and questioned the status of the EPA's requirements; he suggested that when granting a permit, the Board should consider "past p" and that should have a bearing on the issuance of a permit. Both Selectmen Murray and Hotch concurred that these are two separate issues and should be handled individually.

Mr. Craig indicated that due to postponement of the meeting with the EPA, he has nothing further to report; however, he stated that Coatings is under new

management, and the Board of Health, at their request, recently toured Coatings and expressed his opinion that things are proceeding in the right direction.

Mr. Gogolin stated that the Board of Health had requested a tour for about a year, and that following the tour Mr. Craig mentioned, the Board of Health noted that there are still some things that have to be done - there is still potential leakage - but that the attitude and cooperation of the people at Coatings has definitely changed and become more positive at this point. Chief Frost commented that it was also his opinion that Coatings has been more cooperative.

Following further discussion it was on motion by Selectman Hotch

VOTED: To grant a license to Albert J. Zaccone, Technical Director of Coatings Engineering Corporation, 33 Union Avenue, for the additional underground storage of 10,000 gallons of no-lead gasoline, Class A, to be stored in tank #1 and 2, as shown on a plan entitled "Plan of Coatings Engineering Corporation", received by the Board of Selectmen to accompany their application dated March 5, 1979, subject to, prior to using tank #1 and 2, a pressure test being conducted under the supervision of the Fire Chief; likewise, if chemicals were transferred from tank #1 and 2 to the empty 10,000 gallon tank located at the easterly end of the Coatings Building, that it would also be pressure tested under the supervision and approval of the Fire Chief, prior to its use.

(Selectmen Murray and Hotch voting in the affirmative; Selectman Cossart in opposition.) The applicant expressed his agreement to the above procedure.

On the recommendation of Selectman Hotch, the Board directed the Executive Secretary to schedule a meeting following the Annual Town Meeting with the Conservation Commission and the Board of Health relative to the Coatings wastewater discharge situation.

Annual Warrant Review - 1979 Annual Town Meeting

Present: J. Owen Todd, Moderator; Betsey M. Powers, Town Clerk, and other Town Officials.

At 8:00 P.M. Chairman Murray welcomed the Moderator, the Town Clerk and Town Officials, and he called the 1979 Annual Warrant Review to order.

There followed a review of the Warrant for the 1979 Annual Town Meeting, with motions, presentations, and procedures for each article discussed and agreed upon.

The Chairman of the Permanent Building Committee stated that they will ask to have line items 510-13 and 510-21 held at the Annual Town Meeting until Article 13 Police/Fire Headquarters and Article 32 Swim Facility are acted upon.

It was noted that the three following articles will be held for various reasons from the Consent Calendar: #6 Unpaid Bills, #20 Amend Bylaws, Art. XII, 1 - Town Property, and #26 Summer School.

Chairman Murray announced a meeting to discuss fiscal affairs of the Town and pending "Tax Cap" legislation to be held on March 31st at 9:00 a.m. in the Lower Town Hall.

Grant Preapplication Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

The Board reviewed a communication dated March 16, 1979, from the Department of Housing and Urban Development informing the Board that its preapplication for a grant under the 1979 Small Cities program was not accepted for purposes of filing a full application for this fiscal year grant period.

Executive Secretary Richard E. Thompson referenced Sudbury's final rating as shown on a listing of those communities that applied to the State.

On the recommendation of the Executive Secretary, the Board directed him to notify those residents on a waiting list for HUD rehabilitation funds not to anticipate any assistance for an indefinite future period of time.

Dog Pound

Executive Secretary Richard E. Thompson referenced a communication dated March 12, 1979, from the Operational Review Committee (ORC) Chairman written to Dr. Kevin Phillips, Roy F. Weston, Inc., requesting his comment relative to the effect on the Federal/State grant for the joint Wayland/Sudbury septage facility or on the existing Federal/State approval of the site (on Route 20 at the Sudbury Landfill) and the project, if Sudbury were to use a portion of the southwest corner of the parcel designated for the septage facility for its Dog Pound. Mr. Thompson continued to say that the project manager for Roy F. Weston, Dr. Kevin Phillips, responded under the date of March 16th, by stating his opinion that the dog pound site location might affect the EPA design and construction grant, since any change to the site requires another investigation by the Massachusetts DEQE and EPA, and suggesting in approximately one year, the proposed dog pound site would be a viable one.

Mr. Thompson stated that the Board received a letter dated March 19 from a member of the ORC requesting the Board to take no further action at this time relative to the dog pound based on the recommendation of Dr. Phillips and their mutual concerns. The Executive Secretary recommended that immediately following Town Meeting the Board should get together with the Board of Health, the Building Inspector, the ORC and the Town Engineer and other concerned individuals and/or committees for further discussion and possible consensus on the same.

The Board was in agreement that it should be a mutual decision and, therefore, concurred with the recommendation of the Executive Secretary, and directed him to communicate the same to the Health Director, the ORC, the Building Inspector and the Town Engineer. The Board also agreed that in the meantime, the Town Engineer and the Building Inspector should continue with their schedule in formulating plans, through the ORC, for the dog pound at the Sudbury Landfill site location.

Heritage Park Cleanup and Improvements

The Board received a communication dated March 20th from James V. Merloni, Town Engineer, requesting authorization for an expenditure of \$2,000 from the

the Heritage Park account for equipment and materials to be used in Heritage Park for cleanup, erosion repair, widening of the main stone dust walk, redwood edging along all walks, draining and cleaning of pond and rebuilding outlet headwall, and cleaning and reshaping ditches.

Executive Secretary Richard E. Thompson explained that in November of 1977 the Town had a plan to rework Heritage Park but received no bids, and the Town Engineer recommended against rebidding; therefore, the Town submitted a project through the CETA Program which was approved, and consequently CETA personnel will perform the work at Heritage Park. Mr. Thompson stated that all technical work, however, will be done by the Town Engineer, such as draining and pumping out the pond. Mr. Thompson further explained that, although the Town must supply materials and tools for the CETA projects, said tools become CETA property.

Mr. Thompson stated that there is approximately \$8,500 plus interest in the Heritage Park Account, and in answer to Finance Committee member, Edward L. Glazer, stated that the Heritage Park account is made up of monies from gifts, donations and Federal funds.

Mr. Thompson stated that the Town Engineer informed him that he had access to some equipment which could reduce the expenditure request by \$300; the Executive Secretary recommended, however, that the Board approve the total \$2,000 requested to allow flexibility, and stated that the Town Engineer would keep itemized receipts of his purchases and expenditures.

Selectman Hotch stated his opinion that the purchase of a chain saw was unnecessary because one could be borrowed from other Town departments and objected to purchasing duplicate equipment. Selectman Cossart agreed and further stated that if one had to be purchased, it should be for the Highway or Park and Recreation Department.

Selectman Murray suggested a possible savings in the purchase of stone dust by pooling the orders of all Town departments which will be needing stone dust.

Following further discussion it was on motion by Selectman Hotch unanimously

VOTED: To authorize the expenditure of \$1,700 under the direction of the Town Engineer, from the Heritage Park Account, for equipment and materials to be used in Heritage Park for cleanup and repairs, as explained above, and in accordance with the request of the Town Engineer dated March 20, 1979, with the exception of the purchase of a chain saw (reducing the \$2,000 request in the amount of \$300).

Trinity Mental Health Association

Following a brief discussion it was on motion by Selectman William J. Cossart unanimously

VOTED: To forward the communication dated March 16, 1979, from the Trinity Mental Health Association, Inc. of Framingham, Nominating Committee, soliciting

recommendations of Sudbury citizens to serve on its Board, to the Board of Health indicating the Selectmen's disinterest in making a nomination and expressing their overall lack of support for participation in the program.

Ice Rescue by Fire Department

Present: Josiah F. Frost, Fire Chief.

Following a brief discussion it was on motion by Selectman John E. Murray unanimously

VOTED: To commend the efforts of Captain Michael Dunne, Fire Fighters Peter Frost, Douglass Allan, Robert Row, Charles Anderson, George Abrahamson, a neighbor, Cheryl Abrahamson, and an unidentified youth, in the ice rescue on Crystal Lake, Sudbury, in a personal letter from the Board of Selectmen. The Board requested that the Fire Chief inquire as to the name of the unidentified youth and so report the same to the Board.

Proclamation - Sudbury Earth Week

It was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To sign a proclamation designating April 21-28, 1979, as Sudbury Earth Week.

Bonding of Constable John R. MacLean

It was on motion by Selectman Robert J. Hotch unanimously

VOTED: To approve, under Section 92 of Chapter 51 of the General Laws, the surety of the constable's bond of John Robertson MacLean, bond number S-86-93-04, Peerless Insurance Company, surety, in the amount of Three Thousand Dollars, and approve the filing of the bond with the Town Clerk.

Minutes

It was on motion by Selectman William J. Cossart unanimously

VOTED: To approve the minutes of the Regular Session of March 20, 1979, as amended, and the minutes of the Executive Session of March 20, 1979, as drafted.

Current Items of Interest

State Panel Discussion - "Alcohol Abuse"

Chairman Murray informed the Board of a panel discussion entitled "Alcohol Abuse - we can do without it", which he attended with other State officials held under the leadership of Governor King. The Executive Secretary stated that he will supply the other members of the Board with copies of all the literature submitted by Chairman Murray.

Ephraim's of Sudbury

Present: Josiah F. Frost, Fire Chief.

Fire Chief Josiah F. Frost stated that he had received information about the use of an unlicensed function room at Ephraim's, following which he spoke to Mr. Donald Wagoner, Manager of Ephraim's, who confirmed the information. Chief Frost stated that he informed Mr. Wagoner that he should not consider any future unauthorized use of this function room.

Executive Secretary Richard E. Thompson confirmed the Chief's information and stated that he and other Town officials had contacted Mr. Wagoner and reformed him of his rights under the license and what the penalties might be if this type of situation reoccurs.

Chairman Murray stated that the room, which had been used for the party, was originally intended to be used as a storage room and was not included, therefore, on Ephraim's license as a function room. Chairman Murray continued to say that the Board of Health should be notified of this situation since they did not authorize the additional seating which was involved in the use of the function room. The Board strongly agreed that many individuals and Town boards had "bent over backwards" to help Mr. Wagoner, as demonstrated by the most recent approval, dated March 26, 1979, by the Sign Review Board for a temporary sign permit for Ephraim's from March 27 to April 27, 1979, and on the recommendation of Selectman Cossart it was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To communicate to Mr. Donald Wagoner, Manager of Ephraim's of Sudbury, through a letter of reprimand, the Board's serious concern of his indifference to comply with his license requirements concerning his obvious violation in the use of a room not included in his license, and to forward a copy of the same to the Building Inspector.

Amend Bylaws, Art. XII, 1 - Town Property (Article 20)

Present: Edward L. Glazer, Finance Committee.

Executive Secretary Richard E. Thompson brought Article 20 - Amend Bylaws, Art. XII, 1 - Town Property, to the Board's attention for assignment to a Board member for the Annual Town Meeting.

Chairman Murray indicated that although the Board has previously voted to unanimously support the above-mentioned article, he personally would like to speak to amend the wording of the article to eliminate the reference to the Loring Parsonage. Following a lengthy discussion, it was agreed that the Board would speak individually, if necessary, and that Chairman Murray would support an amendment to the article in accordance with his above-mentioned comments, if such an amended motion were made at Town Meeting. It was agreed Selectman Cossart would make the main motion on behalf of the Selectmen.

Selectmen's Meeting Sunday, April 1

It was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To schedule a meeting on Sunday, April 1, 1979, to discuss personal viewpoints and Selectmen's individual reports on the Warrant articles scheduled for the 1979 Annual Town Meeting.

Hosmer House Pre-application for Fiscal Year 1980 Preservation Funds

The Board reviewed a letter dated March 28, 1979 from the Sudbury Historical Commission indicating approval of a pre-application for a preservation fund grant to the Massachusetts Historic Commission for preservation of the Hosmer House.

The Executive Secretary recommended that the Board approve the pre-application, and stated that the Board is anticipating receipt of the Historical Commission's recommendations of a plan for the renovation/preservation of the Hosmer House.

Selectman Cossart expressed his opinion that, before probate of the Estate of Florence Hosmer is completed and the Selectmen take over the full responsibility of the Hosmer House, definite plans for the Hosmer House should be formulated.

Selectman Cossart stressed the point that there is a great opportunity to create a unique plan for the Hosmer House by combined efforts of the many individuals and/or Town boards interested in becoming involved with this project, (such as the Garden Club, the Historical Commission, the Historic Districts Commission, etc.).

Mr. Thompson commented that the Historical Commission is attempting to retain a specialist, perhaps an architect, to help formulate the final plans for the Hosmer House, and monies for the same are contained in the pre-application under discussion.

Chairman Murray reviewed for Selectman Cossart the sequence of events which have taken place at the Hosmer House since the death of Florence Hosmer in preparation of securing the house and appraising and documenting the contents of the Hosmer House, and expressed his opinion that it is imperative that the vacancy on the Historical Commission be filled as soon as possible for the effective operation of that Commission. Chairman Murray also reminded the Board of the original agreement with the late Florence Hosmer to restore the Hosmer House as a memorial to her late father.

Following further discussion, on the recommendation of the Executive Secretary it was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To authorize the Executive Secretary to file an Acquisition and Development Pre-application for Fiscal Year 1980 for preservation funds for the Hosmer House, Sudbury Center Historic District, with the Massachusetts Historical Commission, and to further authorize the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to sign the same.

Grand Opening - B. F. Goodyear, Sousa's Tire Center

The Executive Secretary informed the Board of the Grand Opening of B. F. Goodyear, Sousa's Tire Center, to be held on Monday, April 2nd at 9:15 a.m., and asked the Selectmen if they would like to attend. Chairman Murray indicated that he would attend.

Congregate Housing

The Executive Secretary informed the Board that the Sudbury Housing Authority will be discussing Congregate Housing at their meeting tomorrow evening at 8:00 P.M.

Limited or Light Duty

The Board confirmed that their position taken on February 26, 1979, concerning limited or light duty was intended to also relate to and include Fire Department personnel, and requested that the Fire Chief strongly take this under advisement in dealing with any future personnel matters.

Vandalism

The Board acknowledged receipt of a communication dated March 19th from Mr. Hal Riser dealing with vandalism, and directed the Executive Secretary to inform Mr. Riser that Town officials are continually addressing this issue, and that the next group meeting with Town officials will be held March 30th at 3:00 P.M. at the Loring Parsonage.

Senior Citizens Internship

Responding to a communication dated March 22, 1979, from the Honorable Robert F. Drinan, it was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To recommend the nomination of Col. Paul J. Leahy to the Congressional Senior Citizen Program.

Oak Road Drainage

The Board received a petition dated March 8, 1979, from Mr. and Mrs. Seth Kaplan, with approximately twenty signatures, pertaining to the drainage problem on Oak Road, and directed the Executive Secretary to forward said petition to the Town Engineer for his attention and report on the same.

Tax Caps

The Board acknowledged receipt of a communication dated March 19, 1979, from John H. Wilson, Town Accountant, dealing with Tax Caps.

Registered Professional Engineer Seal - Landham Road Reconstruction Plan

It was on motion unanimously

VOTED: To request that the Town Engineer, James V. Merloni, affix his seal a Registered Professional Engineer in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to the plan entitled, "Reconstruction of Landham Road", drawn by the Town of Sudbury Engineering Department, dated 1979, which plan is drawn in accordance with the vote under Article 11 of the 1978 Annual Town Meeting and the vote under Article 1 of the June 7, 1978, Special Town Meeting.

Selectman Cossart brought the Board's attention to concerns expressed to him regarding the overcrowding at the 99 Restaurant, and suggested that the Board support Officer Carroll, by a letter who has communicated his concerns of the same to the 99 Restaurant, from the Selectmen indicating that the Board will not tolerate another infraction of their license. (The first infraction of their

license was the unauthorized change in the interior of the building.) The Board directed the Executive Secretary to so communicate the same to the Manager and officers of the 99 Restaurant, Sudbury.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned at 12:00 midnight.
