Project Name: Military Training Field Archaeological Survey

<u>Project Description</u>: This proposal requests funding in the amount of \$10,000 to conduct an archaeological survey of the Town-owned military training field located on Old County Road in Sudbury. The parcel is 3 acres in size and was laid out as a training field in 1713 for government storehouses for the West Side Militia drill where gun powder supplies were stored for the Revolutionary War. All manner of stores were dispersed from here when the British began to march westward in 1775 and 1776. The present companies of Sudbury Minute and Militia have trained here and were pictured in the local newspaper in May of 2005.

This is one of the oldest historical sites still in existence in Sudbury, having been first mentioned in Town Meeting records on February 13, 1687. The Town became its official owner in Article 33 of the April 1926 Town Meeting as presented by Forrest Bradshaw.

This property is under the watchful eye of the SHC and in 2007 over \$3,000 was budgeted for the clearing of the small trees and brush from the property which was accomplished by late spring. An \$800 kiosk was installed with the history and maps. The plans for 2008 are to install 20 feet of split rail fence, crushed stone in front of the original stone marker and reseeding of 2 acres. The Mass. Historical Commission has advised this survey be completed before the ground is disturbed, due to its historical importance. All documentation will be sent to Mass. Historical Commission, as well as be on record with the Town.

The Commission is presently soliciting bids from qualified archaeological firms for this project. Duncan Richie, from Public Archeological Laboratory, has given the initial price estimate.

General Criteria

The proposal to fund an archaeological survey of the Military Training Field on Old County Road meets the following Sudbury Community Preservation Committee criteria:

- The project is eligible for Community Preservation Act (CPA) funding according to the requirements described in the CPA legislation.
- The project is consistent with the town's Master Plan and Open Space and Recreation Plan.
- The Board of Selectmen has previously endorsed efforts by the SHC to restore this property.
- This project will preserve the essential character of the town as described in the Master Plan:
- Save resources that would otherwise be threatened and/or serve a currently under-served
 population Documenting this property as an historical resource will remove it for
 consideration by others for other municipal uses, such as housing or wastewater disposal.
- Either serve more than one CPA purpose (especially in linking open space, recreation and community housing) or demonstrate why serving multiple needs is not feasible. The restoration project will serve both a historical purpose, as well as an open space and recreation purpose, as the property will be usable by the public;
- Demonstrate practicality, feasibility, urgency. Conducting the survey now will enable the SHC to properly document the resources, while allowing the seeding to be completed expeditiously this spring.
- Demonstrate that the project can be implemented expeditiously and within budget. The
 preliminary cost estimate was given by a professional in the archaeological field who is
 familiar with the site. We anticipate being able to complete the project within the
 requested budget.

 Preserve or utilize currently owned town assets. This property is owned by the Town of Sudbury, but is presently unprotected.

Open Space Criteria

- Provide opportunities for passive recreation. This property will enable picnics and enjoyment by the public once it is restored.
- Protect or enhance wildlife corridors, promote connectivity of habitat or prevent fragmentation of
- Border a scenic road. Old County Road is a designated Scenic Road. This project will substantially add to the quality of the scenic and historical assets in that neighborhood.

Historic Criteria

- Project demonstrates the ability to provide permanent protection for maintaining the historic resource. The SHC is currently investigating the benefit of placing a historic preservation restriction on the property.
