<u>Project Name:</u> Land Conservation Fund / Potential Acquisition of Broad Acre Farm (33.6 Acres, Parcels F09-0002 and F09-0004)

Project Description:

The goal of this proposal is to have available a Conservation Fund so the Town may take action on high priority, time sensitive future open space acquisition and protection projects. Various mechanisms to achieve this goal exist and will be explored. For example, the Town could refund the existing Conservation Fund; establish a similar land acquisition fund; or allocate funds for a specific project, such as the potential acquisition of Broad Acre Farm.

CPA Funding is requested to allocate money to a Conservation Fund account that may be used to acquire priority conservation lands. The amount requested for the fund is yet to be determined. It is in the interests of the Town's open space and recreation goals to have conservation funds available for utilization for urgent priority acquisitions without going to Town Meeting. For example, when properties enrolled in Chapter 61 will change use, there is only a 120 day period for the Town to take action on its option to acquire land through the Right of First Refusal, which gives the Town limited capacity to act.

The Town's readiness to act on conservation opportunities is highlighted as plans are underway to develop a Chapter 61A, 2009 OSRP priority conservation parcel, Broad Acre Farm on Morse Road. Consideration of creative mechanisms for conservation funding and the reconsideration of funding a Conservation Fund seems warranted.

The Broad Acre Farm land protection opportunity is not the only opportunity before the CPC with an undetermined price tag. A general Conservation Fund could fund any priority conservation project that is a known priority and requires prompt action. Policies and procedures for the administration of the fund would be adopted to structure the decision making process.

The Broad Acres Farm Case

Broad Acres Farm is an active horse farm with stables, pasture, indoor arena and riding fields

located on both sides of Morse Road, a designated Scenic Road. The property provides significant opportunities to connect existing open space and recreation land, as it abuts the following: the parcels north of Morse Road abut the proposed Bruce Freeman Rail Trail (owned by the MassDOT Rail Division), the parcel south of Morse Road abuts the Wake Robin Woods Conservation Land, which currently has no public access; and the parcel to the north of Morse Road and east of the BFRT abuts Featherland Park, a key recreational area in town. The Farm additionally contains three vernal pools and is listed as a Critical Concern in the Heritage Landscape Inventory.

Chapter 61 Background

Many privately owned agricultural, forestry, and recreation parcels in Town are under specially designated tax status to the benefit of both the Town and the landowners. In exchange for beneficial tax status, the land is maintained in the current use or if a sale or conversion of use will occur the owners must offer the Town a right of first refusal to acquire the property.

The Existing Conservation Fund

In 1961, the Sudbury Town Meeting established a Conservation Fund. A set calculation was annually allocated to the fund for the purpose of protecting prime farm and conservation land. Research is underway to determine how the account has been administered and whether associated policies and procedures exist. At some point in time, prior to the adoption of the CPA, Sudbury stopped allocating resources to the Fund.

The Fund was established pursuant to the provisions of G.L. c. 40, § 8C, which indicates the Town may establish a conservation fund, with the treasurer to be the custodian. Interest-earned income therefrom shall be credited to the fund. Money in said fund may be expended by the Conservation Commission for purposes authorized by said statute. The fund may receive gifts and donations, and the town may appropriate money in any year to the fund.

Precedence in Massachusetts

Numerous Massachusetts towns have Conservation Funds, which are funded (in total or part) by CPA funds. They include (according to the Community Preservation Coalition CPA Projects Database): Ayer, Duxbury, Groton, Harvard, Hingham, Lincoln, Maynard, Monson, Needham, Northampton, Norwell, Rockport, Sharon, Stow, Sunderland, Templeton, and Westford.
