Agenda Item 2: Hear and Vote on Special Town Meeting Warrant Articles

Maryanne presented the articles to the Finance Committee.

Article 1: Data used to approve & deny business permits will include unpaid taxes at time of application by both licensee and property owner. Bill Kneeland moved to recommend approval of this article. Adrian Davies seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Article 2, 3, & 5: The goal of these articles is reduce the borrowed amounts by applying close to \$2M in funds from bond premiums to lower the borrowed amounts previously approved; total actually applied against borrowing is much lower that \$2M; why the discrepancy. Maryanne agreed to research this question. Approval is needed by June 30.

Article 4 Johnson Farm Acquisition Cost Funding to Reduce Borrowing Amount: this article asks the Town to appropriate \$66,000 donated by Sudbury Valley Trustees to finance the acquisition of the Johnson Farm land and reduce the amount voted previously for borrowing. Adrian Davies move to recommend approval, Bill Kneeland seconded, and the motion was accepted unanimously.

Fin Com Meeting Minutes 4/27/2015

Discussion on 38, 40 and 41: The amended regional agreement cannot be adopted within the current town meeting cycle because one other town has not approved the regional agreement (Wayland) and Lincoln has "passed over" the vote. Therefore, the Minuteman superintendent has stated that approval during this cycle is not possible. Therefore Pat is recommending to the BOS that they vote to indefinitely postpone these articles which are now moot.

<u>Article 53</u>: Presented by Dan DePompei: This Article supports prioritizing sidewalks that provide walking access to Sudbury public schools for students within a two mile radius of each school. Several town areas are without sidewalk access. After much discussion, it was proposed and agreed that the 2^{nd} sentence of the warrant article be removed prior to Town Meeting, Motion to approve the article as amended – Adrian Davies, 2^{nd} – Bill Kneeland; approval unanimous.

Agenda Item 4: Review Town Meeting Article Assignments

Susan will create the article assignments for Town Meeting

New members should know that books with articles and our recommendations will be supplied so the members know who will express the views (approval, disapproval) of the committee

For articles in which the Fin Com recommendation differs from the recommendations of other committees, we will have comments that explain our disapproval. Specifically,

- Article #28: Lights for Cutting Field: The CIAC and BOS approve this; Fin Com does
 not. Susan drafted a write-up on #28. We should agree on this (in open meeting) on
 Monday night before the Town Meeting.
- For Article #34, a volunteer is needed to write this up for Monday. There being none, the Chair will draft these remarks.

Agenda Item 5: Report on Open Meeting Law Training

Update from Susan Berry

- Meeting minutes will now include the list of documents presented at the meeting. For un-numbered documents (memos, spreadsheets, agenda), these can be scanned and added to the minutes as objects.
- Subcommittee meetings are subject to the same requirement as the FinCom meeting (posting, minutes, etc.) which may affect the makeup of liaison assignments. One member representing Fin Com at a meeting is not a sub-committee
- The Open Law training session is on video on the Town web site
- Members who can't attend a meeting but wish to have an opinion expressed in their absence can email their comments to one other member to be read at the meeting.
 Sending it to all members is a potential violation of the open meeting law.

Comments

- Mark: Are liaisons on the other side (other committee quorums) subject to the same guidelines? Response – members from the other town committees attended the Open Meeting Law training.
- Mark: Uploading agendas and documents on line would be useful (as BOS does)
 would give viewers access to the same documents used in the meeting
- Susan: Comments regarding articles we dis-approve but are approved by other committees should be agreed within our committee done in a way that complies with open meeting, such as the two articles cited above.
- Susan: For dissenting opinions within the group, a member can speak if the group is willing to let the individual speak for the group.
- Susan: Calendar of dates from the Association of Town Finance committees for workshop training. If interested, let Susan know.

Agenda Item 6: Public Comments

Len Simon on Articles 54 and 55.

Against Article 54: There is already a state approved, signed contract in place for a paved rail trail (the Bruce Freeman Rail Trail – BFRT). Surveying and engineering are underway. Construction may begin as soon as 2019 – 2020. This plan has approval from the BOS and 2014 Town Meeting. Progress is being made.

In Article 54, Sudbury Greenways is asking the Town to look at an alternative approach that includes a stone dust surface instead of a paved surface. It will cost \$1M and can be completed before 2019.

Len does not support the Greenways option for these reasons:

- The current hard surface plan includes state funding. A change in plans now may jeopardize state funding when application is made to the MA Department of Transportation (DOT) next year.
- Choosing stone dust now and needing to pave it later is not a simple "pave over asphalt" job. Re-engineering is required. The stone dust surface would have to be removed.
- A rolled stone dust surface needs yearly maintenance. The two bridges on the trail will not support ambulance traffic.

Article 55: This Article also calls for a rolled stone dust surface on the east-west MA Central Rail Trail (MCRT). Amount requested is \$1M. Len's point is that NSTAR has offered to build this at no charge to Sudbury in return for permission to use this path to service and run power transmission lines. We should know NSTAR's decision by November 2015. Given the value of the NSTAR funding, it makes sense to await this decision.

The Chair allowed questions and discussion since this was an item on the agenda and she should have recognized Len Simon for comments under Item 3 even thought the committee was not voting on Article 54 and 55 until after the CIAC vote.

Comments:

- From prior votes, it appears the Town is in favor of the same kind of trail as the section from Lowell to Chelmsford. Article 54 appears to negate this.
- The rails are ultimately owned by the MA DOT.
- The salvage value of the rails is unknown. The value of the rails will be used to defray the costs.
- It is not clear yet if the power lines will be aerial or buried. There are pros and cons to both approaches. The obvious concern with aerial lines is appearance and safety of the trail users.
- The Wayland portion of the east west trail is not impacted by the NSTAR transmission line.

Agenda Item 7: Adjourn – Susan asked for a motion to adjourn. Motion made, seconded, and unanimously approved. The meeting adjourned at 9:57 pm.

We have two recommended changes in the use of Free Cash:

Article 2: FY 15 Budget Adjustments

The Snow and Ice Deficit is now \$450,180.47 which is \$25,180.47 higher than the Finance Committee had voted at their last meeting. (Several bills have come in since that time which have increased the deficit.)

Article 19: Cardiac Monitor Replacement

In further review we cannot revote the use the Chapter 90 article money referred to in Article 31 for the Cardiac Monitor Replacement so we will need to request an additional \$5197.44 in Free Cash for Article 19. (For you convenience I have added a worksheet with the old Article balances that are referred to in Article 31 on page 20 of the 2015 ATM Warrant.)

If both of these adjustments, which total \$30,377.91, are made the balance of the FY 15 Free Cash will be \$500,191.28.
