Introduce Richard Simon, Coordinator of the Sudbury LEPC	Richard explained that the original impetus for the Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPC) grew out of the chemical spill in Bhopal, India, with the intent of planning for hazardous waste spills. Since that time, the mission has been updated to include planning for all types of emergencies including terrorism, pandemics, and natural events.	The role of the LEPC is planning only, not execution of the plan. It serves as a forum for community concerns and gives citizens a change to be part of the planning process. In emergencies, neighborhood and local action will be needed immediately. The Sudbury LEPC is a member of Crossroads LEPC, a collaboration of Wayland, Sudbury, Weston, Lincoln, and Concord.

Wingate	Wingate is required by JCAHO to have a disaster plan, and by the state to have a Continuity of Operations plan (COOP), which includes community linkages and a renewed commitment to coordinate with local authorities.	Evacuation of Wingate residents would be challenging, including transportation not only for the people, but for food, medical supplies and medical records as well.	This sort of contingency is part of the police and fire comprehensive planning. Rick will get plan details, and inform the group of the salient details.

Frost Farm	Barbara has developed a telephone tree. Four people at Frost Farm are contacts for the police and fire, and each of the four will call 10 residents. Barbara and the Trustees are making arrangements to keep a copy of the keys for each resident in the Club House for use in emergencies.	Frost farm would like a generator for the Club House, but funding may be an issue since it would cost \$30-\$40,000. Frost Farm is not a 501(c)(3), and so can't apply for many grants.	
Musketahquid	Jo-Anne reported that depending on budget status, they are considering purchasing a generator that could heat or cool the whole Community Room/office building.	Placement of the generator is a factor, since it runs on diesel fuel, and the exhaust needs to be kept away from the building.	
Senior Center	The Senior Center has been working with the Firefighter's Union to get Lock Boxes for seniors who can't afford them. The Union generously funded 18 lock boxes. The program is offering them to people on the emergency call list, with the understanding that if someone can afford to pay for the box, they will be asked to donate \$60, which would be used to purchase another lock box for someone who couldn't afford it. The boxes will be installed free of charge by the Senior Center Fix-It program volunteers.	How can a Sudbury resident get a lock box if they are not part of this program?	Kris will check with Chief MacLean to see how an individual would go about ordering a lock box.
