- Emotional and Specific Learning (Reading and Math) disabilities are at high levels this school year and have climbed steadily, post-pandemic.
- With specialized programs now at LSRHS- LS Academy (started '20-'21), and 'Partners' (started '22) our numbers in specialized programs have increased.
- Inclusionary practices are meeting student needs in general.

- Approximately 75%-80% of out of district students "arrive" to LSRHS already outplaced by Sudbury or Lincoln Public Schools.
- The strength of LSRHS's specialized programs is reducing the need for out of district placement.
- The downward trend is encouraging.

- LSRHS students have a substantial amount of support. Ex: Associate Principals, School Counselors, Clinical Counselors, Nurses, METCO representative, Clinical Seminars, Student support teams (PEERS, MVP, & Peer mediation).
- LSRHS has an ongoing partnership with guardian(s)/parent(s) such as, parent teacher conferences, 504 & IEP meetings (virtual or in-person), house team parent collaborations, and/or program parent collaborations
- Students who may need additional support are referred to their house team. Programs like the *Beacon Transition program*, the *Academic Support Center* (drop in center), *Academic Interventionist*, and the *ACE alternative programs* are programs that'll support the "targeted" student(s) with many accommodations like smaller class sizes.

Specialized Programs for Students with an IEP

Our Specialized Programs here at LS:

- The Learning Center: serves the majority of students at LS. Liaisons provide academic and skills support
 in a small group setting.
- Link 1: is a Language Based Learning Program that provides skills instruction and academic support in a small group setting.
- Link 2: is a program that supports students on the Autism Spectrum who require structured academic and clinical support in a small group setting.
- Reach: support students with developmental and learning challenges with a focus on vocational and functional academics. Instruction is provided in a small group setting.
- Excel: Students with emotional based challenges who require wrap-around clinical services as well as targeted small group instruction.
- 'Partners': NEW to LS this year. Working in partnership with the New England Center for Children (NECC) the program supports students in an ABA structured classroom.
- LS Academy: is our off-site program for students with emotional based challenges who require wrap-around clinical services in an alternative school setting

Each specialized program provides unique, individualized support for the students supported there. The framework of each program allows for flexibility and thoughtful implementation of the IEP service delivery grid.

* Students of the 'Partners' program are primarily from Curtis Middle School*



- LSRHS received the budget guidance from both towns- Lincoln and Sudbury. Lincoln can support 2.5% of the budget. Lincoln may be able to provide an additional percentage, which is a portion of the OPEB debt and health components. Sudbury's percentage is 3.3% of the FY24 budget.
- On Tuesday, November 8, 2022- there was a preliminary review with Sudbury's department directors "CIAC" for all the capital projects across all departments.
- The evening of Wednesday, November 16, 2022- Lincoln CapCom will hold a formalized meeting.
- A notification to OPEB Trustee for Doodle Poll were given suggestive dates for full actuarial evaluation report by Odyssey Advisors.
- On Wednesday, November 30th there will be a budget development meeting with the broker of Harvard Pilgrim's health insurance. We're hoping to establish a holding number for the FY24 budget.
