Selectmen's Report

To the Citizens of Sudbury:

WAR ORGANIZATION

The thought uppermost in all our minds as we write this report for the year 1941 is the treacherous attack by the Japanese on this country, followed by the declaration of war by Germany and Italy and our declaration of war against them.

This attack united all of us as one to win this war. We should all realize the necessity for sacrificing.

In our civilian defense which plays an important part in this war we are very well organized under the leadership of Mr. Charles H. Way. All citizens should cooperate with his committees. There is also organized a well equipped and trained State Guard unit that is ready to act in any emergency.

CLERK OF COMMITTEES

The Town voted \$1000.00 to have a clerk of all Boards and Town Accountant on duty at regular hours at the Town Hall. We found it impractical this year to combine the two positions. In 1942 this clerk will have extra work to do for the Assessors, as well as extra work for the Rationing Board and we recommend that this position be again kept separate from the accounting position. There is more work this year than one clerk could do.

TRAFFIC

The Selectmen have given much time and thought to Police and Traffic conditions in Sudbury. As a result of a thorough study by the Traffic Control Division of the Department of Public Works, rules and regulations were made. With the enforcement of these regulations traffic conditions will be a great deal better and safer. With the emergency conditions that exist now, a police officer should be on duty at regular hours and subject to call at any time. With automobile tires and other commodities later to be rationed added burden is put on the Police Department to prevent theft.

FINANCE

As shown by the Finance Committee report the Town is in good financial condition, having for the first time in several years about \$8,000.00 available funds, in reserve. The School House bonds are now paid and there remains \$25,000.00 Town Hall bonds.

EULOGY

The Town lost by death this year two highly respected Town Officials—Selectman Everett D. Haynes and Former Selectman Frank W. Goodnow. The Town surely will miss these two men.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE

In closing we again wish to remind you to cooperate fully with the Committee for Civilian Defense. In the event of an air raid many lives will be saved by knowing what to do. We urge all citizens to read the report of the Civilian Defense Committee.

Report of Finance Committee for 1942

February 10th, 1942.

To the Board of Selectmen
Sudbury, Massachusetts.

Gentlemen:-

The Finance Committee of the Town of Sudbury respectfully submits its report for the year 1942.

A review of the financial structure of the Town shows an improved condition over 1941 and a brief outline follows:

The amount recommended by the Finance Committee should not impair the efficient conduct of Town affairs and should be enough for all essential services.

In all of the following recommendations, the Finance Committee has tried to keep always in mind that we are at War and that to win, and win we must, necessitates sacrifices. Living in a wartime economy will produce severe dislocations and hardships which cannot be foreseen, but which are, nevertheless, certain.

There is available from overlay reserve and excess and deficiency \$8,371.51, which could be used this year to reduce the amount of money which the Town must appropriate; but we earnestly recommend that these funds be saved this year and that the money necessary for the conduct of Town business be raised

by taxation. This plan can be followed without increasing the tax rate for 1942 if the Finance Committee's recommendations are respected.

We have the benefit this year of approximately one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) more valuation to levy taxes against, and by not spending our surplus funds they will be available to ease the burden when the full impact of the cost of war hits our Town.

The Finance Committee recommends one motion to cover the salaries and expenses of Town Officers in the amount of \$7,739.50.

The Finance Committee, in considering the salaries of Town Officers, has tried to recommend equitable increases in those departments where the work has increased and also has taken into consideration which members of the various boards carry

the responsibility and have the most to do. We recommend that the Selectmen's salaries be increased to \$600.00, and that the Chairman receive \$250.00, the Secretary \$200.00, and the third member \$150.00.

The Assessor's salaries, we recommend, be increased to \$625.00; the Chairman to receive \$275.00; and the other two members \$175.00 each.

We recommend that the Assessor's expense be reduced to \$300.00, as the Clerk of all Boards is to receive extra compensation to do the special work for which this extra amount was requested.

All Old Age Assistance cases must be re-examined this year, and we recommend the increase in this Board salary account to \$90.00.

The Clerk of All Boards is to obtain the "metes and bounds" of property for the Board of Assessors, and the increase in salary is to cover this extra work. Last year a lawyer was paid \$345.00 for this work, and the Finance Committee was advised that much more could be accomplished at less cost to the Town if the Clerk of All Boards did this work. This Committee feels that \$700.00 is an adequate salary for the Clerk of All Boards under the present arrangement, and the additional \$300.00 recommended was deducted from the Assessor's expense request for this special work, which, when accomplished, should not be reoccurring.

The increase in the Building Inspector's salary should not be an additional burden to the Town if the recommendation of the Finance Committee is followed, namely, to increase the Building permit fee from \$1.00 to \$1.50, which will make this office practically self-supporting.

The Finance Committee recommends one motion to the amount of \$21,685.24 to cover miscellaneous routine expenses.

The additional amount requested for Election Expense this year is to cover the Town, Primary, and State Elections, which occur this year.

The increase in the amount recommended for the Reserve Fund is to take care of Civilian Defense Expenses, \$2,000.00 of which is ear marked for this purpose; this includes \$1,050.00 to cover the cost of additional fire hose, and the balance to be used, if necessary, for general administrative expenses. This will be released from the Reserve Fund for the use of the Civilian Defense Chairman by authority of the Finance Committee.

The amount requested for legal expense was recommended on advice of the Selectmen that this sum was necessary to prosecute cases already before the Town.

The Finance Committee, in recommending \$2,600.00 for the Fire Department, approves payment of the men fighting fires at the rate of fifty cents per hour with a minimum payment of one dollar per fire. No further increases in salaries were approved.

The Finance Committee recommend the appropriation of \$2,200.00 for the Police Department on advice that additional police protection is needed.

Vocational Tuition has been paid for in the past by the Selectmen from their Incidental Account or has appeared as an unpaid bill at the end of the year. It is a mandatory charge against the Town, and the Finance Committee recommend an appropriation of \$400.00 to cover this expense on an estimate by the School Committee of the probable cost.

The School Committee advises that due to rising costs and the addition of a Domestic Arts teacher, an increase of between one and two per cent over its 1941 budget is required.

The Finance Committee recommends one motion appropriating the amount of \$10,350.00 to cover Public Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Soldiers' Relief, W. P. A., and Work Relief Projects.

With the labor of all needed to produce for war, we recommend a reduction of \$500.00 in the amount to be appropriated for Public Welfare.

The \$1,000.00 increase in Old Age Assistance is believed necessary due to the General Court's action in raising the amount which can be paid under this Act.

Work Relief Projects is a Town plan administered by the Selectmen to relieve temporary distress by offering employment at some task for a limited period.

The Finance Committee does not recommend the expenditure of the \$600.00 requested for Aid to Dependent Children, as we understand that the case involved has left town.

The Finance Committee recommends one motion in the amount of \$15,700.00 to cover expenditures by the Highway Department.

In the past, funds were transferred from the Road Machinery Fund to the Road Machinery Account, as they accumulated during the year. This cannot be done legally except by vote of the Town; therefore, it is necessary to establish this account at a higher figure than before. It does not necessarily mean added expense to the Town, as the money accumulated in the Road Machinery Fund, will be available for 1943.

The Finance Committee does not recommend the \$2,000.00 requested for Chapter 90, Construction, as we understand that there will be no matching funds available from the State and County, this year.

The Finance Committee recommends one motion in the amount of \$3,343.46 to cover Insurance and Interest.

To see if the Town will grant or appropriate the sum of \$450.00 or any other sum for the purpose of maintaining a dental clinic in the Sudbury schools, to pass any vote, or take any action thereto.

(The Finance Committee recommend that \$450.00 be appropriated under this article which we understand is sufficient to finish the dental work necessary this year.)

To see if the Town will grant or appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 to buy a tank truck and pump and other necessary equipment for the fire department, to pass any vote, or take any action relative thereto.

(The Finance Committee does not recommend this article, as they feel that with the shortage of Fire Equipment the densely populated cities should have the first opportunity to obtain any such equipment.)

To see if the Town will vote to have its Board of Assessors publish during the year of 1942 a complete and official list of the taxpayers with the assessed valuation of each specifically itemized, and grant or appropriate the sum not exceeding \$500.00 to cover the cost thereof, to pass any vote, or take any action relative thereto.

(The Finance Committee recommends this article.)

To see if the Town will grant or appropriate or otherwise provide a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 for the purchase of a dump truck for Highway Department, pass any vote, or take any action, relative thereto.

(The Finance Committee does not recommend this article.)

To see if the Town will grant or appropriate the sum of \$500.00 or any other sum to construct one or more tennis courts on the Town field in Sudbury Center, pass any votes or take any action relative thereto.

(The Finance Committee does not recommend this article.)

The Finance Committee recommend that the sum of \$68.92 be appropriated to pay unpaid bills.

This was the only unpaid bill to come before the Committee; it was certified by the Selectmen according to law.

To see if the town will request the Selectmen to retire and place upon the pension roll under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 32, Section 85, Seneca W. Hall and vote to take any other action in relation thereto or in connection therewith including the appropriation of \$500.00 for such pension for the current year.

All articles which require an appropriation of money must by Town By-Law be filed in time to be presented at a Finance Committee public hearing which requires seven days public notice. The Finance Committee is also required to file their annual report Feb. 10th. The above article was not submitted to the Finance Committee until that evening. Therefore it was impossible to incorporate it in the report. The Committee, however, considered this article and a majority of the members would recommend it, although feeling that the adoption of a pension plan should be carefully considered.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Sudbury:

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Sudbury, qualified to vote in town elections to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 2, 1942, at six-thirty o'clock in the forenoon; then and there to choose by official ballot in accordance with law, a moderator, a town treasurer, collector of taxes, three constables, a highway surveyor, a tree warden, one member of the school committee to fill vacancy, all for one year; one member of the board of selectmen for two years to fill vacancy; one member of the board of public welfare, one member of the board of health, one member of the school committee, one member of the Goodnow Library committee, one assessor, one member of the board of selectmen, one member of the planning board, all for three years; and also to choose field drivers, fence viewers, a pound keeper and any and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Voted: *That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the improvement of Chapter 90, Maintenance Roads; said sum or any portion thereof to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for the purpose.*

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the improvement of Hudson and Old Sudbury Roads; said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose or take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Board recommends the sum of \$2,000.00.

Voted: *That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the improvement of that portion of the "Hudson-Wayland Road" as formerly known, beginning at the Maynard Road junction; said sum, or any portion thereof to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose.*

Article 7. To see if the Town will request its Senator and Representative in the General Court to favor the enactment of House Bills 435, 436, 437, 438, and 587 for the further regulating of Outdoor (billboard) Advertising. Or act thereon.

Voted: *That the Town request its Senator and Representatives in the General Court to favor the enactment of House Bills, 435, 436, 437, 438 and 587 for the further regulating of Outdoor (billboard) Advertising.*

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to request the County Commissioners to re-locate a portion of Dutton Road near the residences of Herbert J. Atkinson and Mrs. Ethel Stearns as shown on a map by the County Engineers dated September 7, 1940, pass any vote or take any action relative thereto.

Voted: *That the subject matter of this article be indefinitely postponed.*

(Article 9. Already acted on).

Article 10. To see if the Town will establish a Town Forest on land of low value acquired by the Town due to tax titles sales.

A motion "that the Town establish a Town Forest" as proposed in this article was lost.

A motion "that a committee be appointed to study the matter and report at next annual meeting" was lost.

Whereupon it was

Voted: That the Selectmen appoint a committee to study and report on establishing a Town Forest on land of low value acquired by the Town through tax titles.

Further Voted: To make the Planning Board such committee.

Article 11. To see if the Town will amend its by-laws pertaining to its Finance Committee replacing Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 of Article 4 of its present by-laws by the adoption of the following:

Section 1. There shall be a Finance Committee consisting of five legal voters of the Town, who shall be appointed by the Selectmen as hereinafter provided. No elective or appointive town officer or town employee shall be eligible to serve on said committee.

Section 2. This by-law shall become effective the day following the adjournment of the 1942 Annual Town Meeting and the term of office of the existing Committee shall be extended until the qualification of the new board. The Selectmen shall within thirty days after this by-law becomes effective appoint three members of said Committee for terms of one year, two members for terms of two years. Within thirty days after each annual town meeting thereafter the Selectmen shall appoint two members of said committee for terms of two years and one member for a term of one year. The terms of office of said members shall commence immediately upon qualification and shall expire at the close of final adjournment of the annual town meeting at which their successors are appointed. Said committee shall cause to be kept a true record of its proceedings.

Section 3. The said committee shall fill any vacancy which may occur in its membership, by vote, attested copy of which shall be sent by the secretary to the Town Clerk. If any member is absent from five consecutive meetings of said committee, except in case of illness, his position shall be deemed to be vacant and shall be filled as herein provided. The term of office of any person so chosen to fill a vacancy shall expire at the final adjournment of the next succeeding annual town meeting, and the Selectmen shall appoint his successor to complete the unexpired term of the member in whose office such vacancy originally occurred.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of this committee to consider all articles of any town meeting warrant under which appropriation of money may be made, and report in writing to the Selectmen, their recommendations. The Selectmen shall cause this report to

be printed in the annual town report. The Finance Committee shall hold a public hearing thereon. Notices of hearing to be posted not less than seven days previously in the same manner as notices for the town meetings.

Section 5. For special town meeting the Selectmen shall immediately furnish the Finance Committee with a copy of the warrant. The Finance Committee shall hold such hearings as may in their judgment be required, and report in writing to the Selectmen at the meeting.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee annually to consider the expenditures in previous years and the estimated requirements for the ensuing year of the several boards, officers and committees of the Town, as prepared by them in such form and detail as may be prescribed by said committee and submitted to said committee not later than Dec. 21. The said committee shall add to such statement of expenditures and estimates another column, giving the amounts which in its opinion should be appropriated for the ensuing year, and shall further add thereto such explanations and suggestions relating to the proposed appropriations as it may deem expedient, and report thereon as provided in section four.

Section 7. In the discharge of its duty, said committee shall have free access to all books of record and accounts, bills and vouchers on which money has been or may be paid from the Town treasury. Officers, boards and committees of the Town shall, upon request, furnish said committee with facts, figures and any other information pertaining to their several activities.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to make an annual report of its doings, with recommendations relative to financial matters and the the conduct of Town business to be contained in the annual town report. Such report shall be submitted to the Selectmen not later than Feb. 10th.

Voted unanimously: That the amendments to the Town by-laws, relating to the Finance Committee set forth in this article, be and the same hereby are approved and adopted.

Thereupon a motion to rescind the action taken under under article six, was lost.

Whereupon the meeting was declared adjourned by the Moderator.

"Section 8. A parent, keeper, superintendent or other person required by Section 6 to give or cause to be given notice of a birth or death, neglecting so to do for ten days after the time limited therefor . . . shall forfeit not more than five dollars."

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the accounts of the town of Sudbury for the period from January 18, 1939 to May 31, 1941, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing town funds or committing bills for collection, were examined and reconciled with the books and records of the town accountant.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. At the beginning of the audit on June 2, 1941, the collector's cash on hand was counted, and immediately following this he admitted that he was short in his cash and submitted his resignation. He subsequently made payments to the treasurer on June 4 and June 12, 1941, these payments amounting to \$3,298.92 and representing his shortage so far as could be determined at that time.

The property, motor vehicle excise, and water district taxes outstanding according to the previous examination were audited, and all subsequent commitments were reconciled with the assessors' warrants. The payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's cash book, the recorded abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing notices to all persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town.

During the examination of the tax accounts, it was found that prior to the final settlement, the collector at various times had overpaid the treasurer \$142.82, which was offset in part by a returned verification notice with proof that \$62.30 had been paid to the collector and had not been entered on the collector's books or paid to the treasurer. Several other notices were received claiming that payment had been made but none of these was supported by proof of payment.

The board of selectmen appointed a temporary collector whose bond was approved June 20, 1941, and the amounts of outstanding taxes and assessments were furnished to the board of assessors for recommitment to the temporary collector.

It is important that the provisions of Section 61, Chapter 60, General Laws, as amended, be followed by the collector when subsequent taxes are to be added to an existing tax title account.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were checked with the treasurer's books and departmental records, while the recorded payments were compared with the treasury warrants and the treasurer's books.

The appropriations and transfers, as recorded in the ledger, were checked with the town clerk's records of town meetings and with the finance committee's records of transfers authorized from the reserve fund.

The ledger accounts were analyzed, a trial balance was drawn off proving the accounts to be in balance, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of May 31, 1941.

It was noted that at the town meeting of March 6, 1940, it was voted to authorize the selectmen and finance committee to make transfers from the road machinery fund to the road machinery account. Such transfers require specific votes of the town and the authority to make them may not be delegated by the town.

Certain paid vouchers lacked sufficient detail. No bill should be placed on a warrant for payment unless the voucher is sufficiently itemized to allow the town accountant to establish the correctness of the charge.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records in the departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The cash balance on May 31, 1941, was verified by a reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The payments on account of debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and listed. The income was proved and the expenditures were verified.

The records of tax titles taken by the town since the previous audit were checked with the deeds on file. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records, the recorded redemptions were checked with the receipts as shown on the treasurer's cash book, and the tax titles on hand were listed, proved, and checked with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The town clerk's records of sporting, dog, and gasoline licenses were examined, the payments to the State being verified by comparison with the receipts on file and the payments to the town treasurer being compared with the treasurer's cash book.

The accounts of the public welfare department, including the bureau of old age assistance, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked, and reconciled with the accountant's books.

The surety bonds of the financial officials bonded for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the balance sheet referred to, there are appended to this report tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's and the tax collector's cash, together with summaries of the tax, assessment, departmental, and tax title accounts, as well as tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the cooperation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

Civilian Defense Committee Report

All departments of Civilian Defense have now been organized, incorporating in the defense set-up those parts of the Red Cross Disaster organization whose functions are similar. A brief description follows.

Report Center

The heart of the Civilian Defense organization is the Report Center to be located in the larger office at the Town Hall. This Center will be staffed by the General Chairman, secretary, a telephone operator, the principal division directors and the chief air raid wardens. To this Center will come all warnings from the Framingham Control Center as well as all reports from wardens. From it will go all instructions to the various defense sections. During an air raid alert this Center has supreme command of all activities.

Protection Division Clifton Giles, Director

Maxwell Eaton, Chief Air Raid Warden for Men
Gertrude M. Halleran, Chief Air Raid Warden for Women

This section covers Air Raid Wardens, both patrol and fixed post, Fire Department, Police Department, road repair crew, building rescue crew, blackout control, evacuation and gas decontamination. The town has been divided into eleven sectors each with a sector post staffed by women wardens. Each sector has again been divided into patrol areas, each area being the responsibility of one or more men patrol wardens. These patrol wardens are charged with the duty of patrolling their areas to check completeness of blackout, citizen observation of air raid regulations and any damage done in their areas by enemy action. They make all reports to their sector post wardens who relay them to the Report Center. The sector post wardens are charged with the immediate supervision of all reports emanating from the area under their control during air raids.

The wardens selected are without exception men who are well known in their respective areas and upon whom the householders can depend. It is to be hoped that everyone will realize the necessity of prompt and complete obedience to wardens' orders.

Fire, police, road repair crews, building rescue crews, etc. will all be based near the Report Center. Upon receipt of a damage report from any sector post the proper crew will be dispatched to the scene immediately. The State Guard will also be on post for emergency traffic control. In the event of fire the householders should, of course, use all possible effort to control the flames until the fire department arrives. Wardens will be identified with arm bands during emergencies and will have

identification cards at all times. Householders are urged to learn the identity of wardens in their sectors and to question the authority of any strangers purporting to be air raid wardens.

Blackout Gertrude M. Halleran, Director

Miss Gertrude M. Halleran is in charge of the preparations for blackout. From her through wardens every house will be furnished with a pamphlet giving directions for blacking out of all buildings and the emergency measures which should be taken to protect houses and occupants. It is the duty of everyone to follow these instructions implicitly. Every family not taking the necessary precautions is jeopardizing not only its own safety but that of the community at large.

Evacuation Albert E. Haynes, Chairman

Evacuation from Sudbury appears extremely improbable in view of the likely methods of enemy action. Evacuation to Sudbury is possible in the event of air attacks in some of the highly populated coastal areas. The Evacuation Division has found quarters for a large number of people in an emergency. However, more space may be needed and any citizen having extra space at this time should notify Mr. Haynes without delay. The Director is required to list all available space for emergency use. Only shelter will be required. Feeding will be taken care of through the canteen of the Red Cross Disaster Committee.

Medical Division Dr. George E. Currier, Director

This division is responsible for all medical aid and health activities and is entirely Red Cross personnel. Two fixed first aid posts are provided for, one in the lower Town Hall and the other at the Nursing Association rooms. A beach wagon will be equipped as a mobile first aid station and two other beach wagons will be equipped as ambulances. The medical staff has two doctors, six registered nurses and numerous qualified first aid workers. Its equipment has been assembled and stored ready for immediate distribution when needed. Minor injuries suffered during an emergency will be treated on the spot while the more serious cases will be sent to Framingham hospital. This division, as in the case of other Red Cross Disaster Committees, stands ready to function not only during air raids but also during any emergencies resulting from peace time catastrophies such as floods, forest fires, etc.

Service and Supplies Everett N. Sanders, Director.

This division is staffed in nearly all activities by Red Cross Cross disaster workers. It is concerned principally with the transporting, feeding, housing and clothing of persons who

may be adversely affected in an emergency. Provision has been made for the purchasing of all necessary supplies as well as the emergency protection of communication lines and other public utilities. It also contains a division to assist in solving fuel problems which might arise in connection with our war effort.

Emergency Functioning of Civilian Defense

On notification of an alert from Army Headquarters by way of the Framingham Control Center all personnel will be assembled and posts will be manned. The alert represents a private warning of the possibility of an air raid, the general public is not warned until the threat of a raid in this particular area becomes imminent.

In the event of a raid aimed directly at our vicinity public warning will be given by continuous sounding of the fire signal, fire and police car sirens and church bells. Other than this the fire siren in the future will be sounded only once at noon for test and three for a fire not connected with a war emergency. Upon this warning householders must prepare themselves in accordance with instructions. We must stress that it is the householder's duty to comply with all regulations and with requests of their A.R.P. wardens as only by complete cooperation can everything function smoothly and properly.

Fire Department Report

To the Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen:-

I herewith submit my Eleventh Annual Report of the Fire Department. I regret to report a big increase in the number of fires probably due in part to the unusual dry condition of the fields and woodlands. During 1941 the department had ninety-eight calls. Sixty-seven were grass and woods fires most of which were extinguished while they were small, others spread rapidly over considerable area but with the aid of apparatus from the State and neighboring towns, were extinguished without any great loss. There were thirteen chimney fires. These fires endanger not only the house itself, but the surrounding buildings and could be avoided if chimneys were inspected and cleaned often. Eight fires involved buildings. Two of these had gained considerable headway before being discovered and the lack of a water supply made it evident that nothing could be done but to save the surrounding property. There were four automobile fires and six emergency calls.

In order to save time and confusion anyone needing the services of the fire department should call the telephone operator and give her definite information as to the location and the need.

In these uncertain times everyone should realize that fires caused by carelessness are always a threat to the community and should be guarded against as well as fires from enemy planes.

As a measure of preparedness the Defense Committee requested the organization of an auxiliary fire department to work with the regular department in the event of an air raid. A meeting was called and about twenty men signed up. A number of these men have been taken for other branches of the Civilian Defense. Some of these places have been filled but there is still a need for more men in this department. Any man who is not already in defense work can find a place on this Auxiliary Fire Department. Drills are held Monday evenings in conjunction with the regular department. Defense work has drawn on the personnel of our regular department. One officer is in Scotland, another member is on the fire department at Camp Devens and others are working on defense projects out of town.

At the request of those in charge of Civilian Defense of the State and in consideration of the needs of the Town for additional equipment, I am recommending the purchase of a tank truck of not less than 500 gallons water carrying capacity with the addition of small diameter hose and some hand equipment. I feel this would furnish added protection not only in war time but

would be invaluable to the sections of the town which have not adequate water supply in case of fire.

With deep regret I record the death on Dec. 14, 1941 of Everett Haynes. He was always ready at the sound of the alarm to do his part even when his health should have forbid it.

I sincerely thank the Town Officials, members of the department, the auxiliary members, Telephone Operators and all those who have in any way assisted throughout the year for their cooperation.

Report of Moth Superintendent

To the Board of Selectmen
Sudbury, Mass.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit the following report of the Moth Department:

The moth situation shows no improvement over last year. Estimated 1000 acres show heavy feeding and stripping of foliage.

The trees beside the highways, we scouted, and egg clusters were treated with creosote. Tent caterpillars were treated with good results. The trees and brush beside the roads were sprayed, and with few exceptions showed no heavy feeding. Fish oil was used for a spreader where it was possible to use it. At the request of the State Department we used creosote in the spray to repel bees.

We received supplies from the Commonwealth amounting to \$372.26. We also received \$125. direct from the State for creosoting egg clusters.

Middlesex County Extension Service

The following is a report of some of the activities of the Middlesex County Extension Service in the town of Sudbury during the year 1941:

As Sudbury is one of the leading dairy towns in the county, much time was spent on assisting local farmers in planning their farm program, improvement of pastures, dairy cattle and feeding, and milk marketing. Mr. Clifford A. Wright and Mr. Aubrey W. Borden served as Directors of the Framingham Milk Producers' Association, an organization active in stabilizing the market for local farmers. Mr. Arthur Fisher was a member of the Herd Improvement Association. General assistance was given the poultrymen of the town in their general problems of disease control, brooding and rearing. Mr. F. L. McGettigan served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Middlesex County Poultry Association. Many farm visits were made on request to assist in orchard management and the production of vegetables.

Mrs. William Brennan served as Town Chairman for the homemakers. During the latter part of the year Mrs. Webster Cutting also served as Chairman of the group. A series of meetings were held within the town in food preservation, food preparation, the making of slip covers and reupholstery of furniture. Meetings were also held on the making of Christmas greens and Christmas foods.

Ten boys and girls clubs were organized during the year with a total enrollment of 183, the second largest of any town in the county. Mrs. William Davison served as Town 4-H Club Chairman, along with the following other members: Mrs. Eunice Garfield, Mrs. Charles Richardson, Mrs. Caroline Stone, Mrs. Webster Cutting, Mrs. John Gaughan, Mrs. Margaret Salomen, Mr. Alan Flynn, Mr. Arnold Rogean, Mr. Albert Tallant, Mr. John Batchelder and Mr. Richard Burckes.

Public Health Nursing Association Report

To the Citizens of Sudbury:

Miss Ethel M. Perry, as Public Health Nurse in 1941, has made 1382 visits to 463 cases. These visits are classified as follows: Maternity service—antepartum 52, postpartum 51; morbidity service—non-communicable 343; health services—new-born 78, infant 147, preschool 316, school 338, adult 12, unclassified 45.

The nurse has also conducted 10 Well Child Conferences, with Dr. Moynihan, for the Board of Health; weekly Dental Clinics, with Dr. Rawding, for the Sudbury Dental Clinic Group; and a course in Nutrition and Low Cost Foods for Health, Miss Hayes of the State Department of Public Health instructing. Miss Perry has given the Red Cross course of instruction in Home Nursing, and is working with Dr. Currier as co-chairman of the town medical committee. She has attended conferences on school nursing, deafness, care of crippled children, infantile paralysis, and other subjects to render our nursing service of greater benefit to the community.

62 infants and 66 preschool children were seen at the Well Child Conferences. As the name implies, children seen at this clinic are supposedly well children; nevertheless, 9 defects discovered were corrected; 3 children entered school with defects under treatment; 4 more under treatment have moved elsewhere. The Welfare Board estimates that we have saved that department over Five Hundred Dollars this year; the saving in years to come through early correction of defects in the health of our future citizens should be no less gratifying to every tax payer.

A premature baby carrier has been added to our loan closet. Please do not forget that the loan closet is maintained for your benefit; there is no charge for the use of articles you may have great need of temporarily.—And don't forget that the Public Health Nurse can help YOU when you need skilled nursing care on a part time basis. Simply call Sudbury 45 between 8:30 and 9 A. M. or between 1:30 and 2 P. M.

I have inspected all neat cattle, sheep and swine as ordered by the Division of Livestock Disease Control.

Sixty premises were visited during the year, of which there were 735 head of cattle, 3,750 swine and 50 sheep.

175 cattle were shipped in from other states which were examined by me and released from quarantine.

Where cattle reacted to the tuberculosis test, the barns were inspected to see that they were properly disinfected.

12 dog bites were reported to me by the Board of Health; the dogs were quarantined for fourteen days. No cases of Rabies found.

Report of the Goodnow Library

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY COMMITTEE

Total expenditures in 1941 were approximately the same as in the previous year, but it was possible to increase new book purchases by more than one-third. A large proportion of books mentioned in "best seller" lists were made available to users of the Library. This was early determined as a fixed committee policy, since the wide appeal of such books had been convincingly demonstrated and seemed a better guide than merely following the personal tastes or possible prejudices of the committee. With regard to other new book purchases the committee continued a policy of attempting to select those of more than merely passing interest. Special attention was given to childrens' books and those for beginner readers.

During the past year many new readers were added to the regular users of the Library. Several out-of-town visitors went out of their way to express their approval. The collection of Indian relics continued to create interest and a notable addition was made from excavations in North Sudbury by our local group of archeologists. We wish again to thank those who have loaned these exhibits, and the Garden Club which supplied and arranged flowers for the Library at various times.

A current events corner has been created in the main reading room consisting of a new terrestrial globe, and books on foreign affairs and other timely subjects. Due to the courtesy of Mr. Winship, a map of the Pacific area is available, and it is intended to add others from time to time.

The only extraordinary expenses during the year occurred in connection with a roof leak which was eventually located around an unused chimney. In view of the poor condition of the mortar in this chimney, it was decided that the cheapest course over a period would be to take it down to below the roof level and slate in the opening. This was done by Mr. Giles and George H. Richard and Son at a total cost of \$34.00.

The committee wishes to express appreciation to Miss Atkinson and Mr. Giles for their continued cooperation and interest in all the library activities.

New residents in town still continue to be impressed by our library and the quantity of new books which we have.

We have borrowed a large number of reference books from the State library, thus furnishing many of the students with material for thesis. If you desire any non-fiction book which we have not already in the library, don't hesitate to ask me to obtain it for you.

We have acted in all cases on the premise that such zoning by-laws were passed by the town for the public good, and that only such variances should be allowed as would serve that purpose, without causing undue hardship to the individual.

Like many laws, these by-laws carry the right of appeal. In this case the appeal goes to the Board of Appeals for action. To carry it still further, the aggrieved party may carry his appeal to the courts for satisfaction. This may explain why such by-laws, that carry the right of appeal, are not always enforced according to the letter of the law.

The following is a list of the applications received and the actions taken by the Board during 1941:

Alan F. Flynn—To erect a garage on Goodman Hill Road not at the rear of the house. Granted.

Clarence E. Baldwin—To enlarge poultry business on Concord Road. Granted.

John Ristuccio—To keep hogs on his property on North Road, North Sudbury. Refused.

Fred Mercier—To enlarge poultry business on Autumn Street. Granted.

Harry Rice—To erect a milk house nearer the street than the laws allows. Granted.

Alvin Moore—To keep poultry on Horse Pond Road. Application withdrawn.

Reuben Dunsford—To erect garage on Peakham Road not in rear of house. Granted.

Lester M. Smith—To keep mink on property off Landham Road. Granted with restrictions.

James Cavicchio—To move piggery to west end of farm—No action, no authority to act.

Algy Alexander—To operate a garage on Maynard Road. Granted.

B. M. Hammer—To erect a house on property off Peakham Road. Granted.

There has been some agitation to suspend or recind sections of the Zoning By-Laws, which have to do with agriculture, for the duration of the war. The Board feels that such action would not be advisable. We feel that the Board of Appeals can allow whatever increases in production that might be requested of farmers by the Secretary of Agriculture, and still not defeat the original purpose of the law.

During the year the Board has established the following two regulations:

1. Every application to the Board of Appeals must be accompanied by a list of all owners of abutting property.

2. A fee of \$2.00 will be charged each applicant who is given a public hearing. Such fee is expected to cover the cost of advertising.

The Board has made a conscientious effort to discharge its duties with justice and satisfaction during the past year.

Report of the Public Welfare Board

To the Citizens of Sudbury:

The Board of Public Welfare takes pleasure in presenting the following report for the year 1941.

During the past twelve months, twenty-two families including eighty-seven individuals, have been cared for under Temporary aid, as compared to one hundred and sixty-five individuals in the previous year. Of these, seven families have settlements elsewhere, with full reimbursement to the Town of Sudbury.

Since the month of May no employables have been aided except in cases of hospitalization with attendant need.

In the early part of the year one of our Temporary Aid cases was transferred to Aid to Dependent Children with an appreciable increase of expenditure; five-sixths of the amount expended will eventually be returned to the Town through State and Federal Agencies.

Under the Division of General Relief we have two Infirmity cases, one Division of Child Guardianship, and a Rest Home case all of which bid fair to be of long duration, and a drain on our resources for an indefinite length of time.

Thirty cases have been aided under the Department of Old Age Assistance; of these, eight have settlements else-where, with full reimbursement to the Town of Sudbury, while we have three Sudbury settled cases living in other towns chargeable in proportionate part to Sudbury.

The Employment Agency which has been in operation by the Department over a period of several years has been unusually successful in bringing employment to the needy in the past twelve months.

To all of those who have made use of this unofficial service, we wish to express our gratitude for the cooperation which has helped alike the tax payer and the needy.

The Federal Surplus Commodities have, so far as practicable, been diverted from Active and Border line cases in the greater interest of necessities in the school lunch program.

We desire to thank the Road Commissioner, the Moth Superintendent and the other Town officials for their spirit of helpfulness along labor lines.

And to all citizens of the town we wish to express our appreciation for their forbearance regarding the ever increasing

complexities, and constant changes which govern the work of our Board.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of the Town of Sudbury:

The year 1941 has brought important changes in your school system.

Sudbury is now in a Superintendency Union made up of three instead of four member towns. When the School Committee of Dover announced that it was the intention of their town to withdraw from the Union at the close of the school year in June 1941, the Committees representing the towns of Sherborn, Sudbury and Wayland met and voted to continue as Union No. 29 after the withdrawal of Dover.

As soon as these decisions were approved by the Massachusetts Commissioner of Education the Joint Committee of this Union applied itself to the task of selecting a School Superintendent to replace Mr. Frank H. Benedict, who had reached the retirement age. This task is of great importance since the Superintendent is the executive officer of the system. He must recommend teachers for election, courses of study and text-books. He is responsible for carrying out educational policies and supervising the details of administration. Incidentally he must possess a certificate from the Department of Education.

After personal interviews and investigation of the records of a large number of promising candidates, Mr. Alfred R. Kenyon from Sheffield Mass. Union was elected. Mr. Kenyon has begun his work with enthusiasm and we are confident his work here will justify his election.

There have been several changes in the school faculty. Miss Mildred Colwell has replaced Miss Doris Heald as teacher of French and Latin. Miss Marion Phillips was elected to fill the position previously held by Miss Alice May; and Mr. John H. Caldwell succeeded Mr. Harry Kendall who was called for army service.

When Mrs. Caroline Stone who for twelve years as Supervisor of Sewing had been helper and friend to the girls in her classes, resigned her position, it was considered advisable to broaden the scope of the existing Household Arts work to include Foods, Clothing, and Home Management. Only a beginning in developing these courses has been made this year, but they should become as valuable as any in the High School. For it is now, and will continue to be, of vital importance to know how to obtain the largest possible value from food and other material used in the home. The slight increase in the school budget, submitted for 1942, is due to the needs of this department.

In addition to class room work, Miss Delphine Perrault, elected to teach the Domestic Arts, is also manager of the Cafeteria. With this set-up your school may take advantage of the federal surplus commodities available for school lunch-

rooms. Judging from the increase in lunch-room patronage, it appears that parents and students alike are pleased with the results of this planning.

Sudbury schools have an excellent staff of teachers, with high professional standards, who co-operate wholeheartedly toward the development of a fine educational system.

The Senior Play coached by Mrs. Willa A. Moody, and the High School Debate under the auspices of the Grange, were enthusiastically praised by those who attended.

The Sudbury Dental Group, carrying on the project begun by the Kiwanis Club a few years ago, makes it possible for Sudbury students to have their teeth cared for conveniently, economically and expertly. We thank this group and other agencies that have taken an active part in the health improvement program.

We are glad to express appreciation of the conscientious performance of their duties by janitors and bus drivers. They contribute greatly to the safety and comfort of pupils.

From last year's graduating class, Mr. Alvin L. Bradshaw, now attending Massachusetts Institute of Technology, was awarded the Geo. J. Raymond Scholarship, and Mr. Loring Smith, attending Yale University, received the Sudbury Woman's Club award. Assisting young people in acquiring higher training for world service is of value to the school and to the individual recipient. The fine spirit of the donors of these prizes is appreciated, and the winners are to be congratulated on their success.

Since the management of your schools is of interest to the citizens of the town, from the viewpoint both of the taxpayers and of the parents of the students, we feel sure you will read the reports which follow.

This opportunity is taken to thank everyone who has in any way helped to make the school year successful.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Sudbury:

I present herewith my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools. In these first few months I have found much to admire in the school system. The teachers and principals are capable and cooperative, and the work of the schools is progressing normally. There seems to be a fine spirit among teachers and pupils which speaks well for both the schools and the Town.

AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK

American Education Week was observed throughout the country during the week beginning November 9. Parents and townspeople were invited to visit our schools in regular session, but a rather small number attended. An open night was held in each school from 7:30 to 8:30 P. M. when parents and others were invited to meet teachers in their classrooms and see some of the class work. This part of the observance was more successful. Many fathers and mothers visited the schools and went away with a better understanding of the teachers and the work that is being done.

PROGRAM OF STUDIES

The elementary program of studies has been strengthened by the introduction of text books offering a more suitable sequence of material.

CLOSING

I appreciate the opportunity of serving as your Superintendent of Schools. My coming here has been made pleasant by many acts of consideration both official and unofficial.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Superintendent of Schools

Dear Sir:

The present emergency makes us keenly aware that every American must without delay prepare to serve his country. Our first duty as teachers is to prepare youth to assume the responsibilities of active and productive citizenship.

HEALTH PROGRAM

Health plays a vital part in our war effort. It is a state of being which is affected by many factors. We are indeed fortunate to have a resident school physician, a nurse in daily attendance, and a dentist who comes to the school weekly. Through physical check-ups, health education, recreation, prevention and control of communicable diseases, substantial school lunches, and safety education, we share with the home and other agencies in the promotion of health.

TRAINING FOR DEFENSE

The pupils of our school are willing and anxious to take an active part in the civilian defense program. To promote preparation toward active participation, I have secured through the Sudbury Red Cross a registered teacher who will give a complete course in first aid. Furthermore, as soon as suitable material can be assembled, I plan to present a comprehensive course in air raid precaution. At present a group of over thirty boys and girls have volunteered for active duty as messengers to assist our wardens in the event of a general emergency.

GUIDANCE

It is the desire of the teaching staff to be of unlimited service to each student. The principal confers with each student three times per year regarding courses of study, study habits, future schools or occupations in order to assist him in making wise choices and adjustments. The teachers have visited many of the homes and have received much aid through parental co-operation. We are pleased that so many parents are visiting their school and taking an active interest in all phases of school endeavor.

HOMEWORK

The school program is organized so that most pupils have two study periods per day. We expect that one-half of the study assignments will be completed in school. Homework is necessary, and in most cases it must be constantly supervised by the parents. We prescribe home study for the average pupil

as follows: Grade 7, thirty minutes daily; Grade 8, sixty minutes daily; Grades 9-12, ninety minutes daily. Regular study habits and regular attendance bring success.

DRAMATICS

We wish to thank the townspeople for the financial backing and the enthusiastic reception of our senior play. Dramatics play a very important part in a well balanced school program.

COLLEGE CERTIFICATION

The splendid record of our graduates now attending colleges has preserved our Class A rating. This rating permits us to certify our honor students to the leading colleges and universities. Ten members of the seventeen graduates of the Class of 1941 are continuing their education this year.

REPORT OF THE ART AND MUSIC SUPERVISOR

Superintendent of Schools

Dear Sir:

Because Art is being recognized to-day as an important factor in education, the schools of Sudbury now have an Art program started in Jan. 1941, designed to bring the influence of Art within the grasp of every pupil. The curriculum has been planned with two major objectives. The Social Objective embodies the establishment of fundamental art concepts by training pupils both to appreciate and create drawings, paintings, designs, constructions and color studies; by guidance in observation and interpretation of beauty and by using art as a means of expressing classroom endeavor. The vocational objective relates to future needs of pupils by discovery and encouragement of those possessing unusual ability.

Five pupils have received awards in a state-wide Poster Contest:

Elina Floridia—second bronze medal.
Alice Chamberlain—books.
Irene Forsythe—books.
Royal Haynes—books.

Through the generosity of the Sudbury Women's Club, a scholarship was established to enable a gifted pupil to study at the Sudbury Art Centre.

There will be an exhibit of art work at the end of the school year to which everyone is cordially invited.

Music has been conducted under my supervision since Sept. 1941. A basic curriculum has been carefully planned to meet the prescribed state requirements. It will be in full operation by the beginning of the coming school year.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

Superintendent of Schools

Dear Sir:

My report for 1941 as school physician is as follows:

During 1941 we had an epidemic of measles and a number of cases of mumps. Other communicable diseases were not prevalent, with exception of colds and respiratory infections.

Diphtheria immunizations and Shick tests were given as usual last Spring.

Detailed notifications were sent to all parents following medical and dental examinations at the start of the Fall term. We are attempting to keep parents informed of the state of health of their children in this manner. Miss Perry and I wish to emphasize this point: Children with colds, sore throats, fevers and other symptoms should be kept at home and cared for, for two main reasons: (1) Prevent exposure of healthy children (2) To insure rapid recovery without complications.

I recommend that all children who have not received immunizations against diphtheria get them this year, either at their family physician's or at school. Also, whooping cough vaccine is of definite value.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Superintendent of Schools
Sudbury, Mass.

Dear Sir:

As School Nurse for the past year, I submit the following report.

Each morning I have visited the South School and the Center School and have treated or checked on the pupils referred to me by the teachers. Routine classroom inspection has been carried out. This may consist of an inspection, (1) for symptoms of acute communicable diseases, (2) for skin diseases or

parasites, (3) for health needs of individual pupils. It was necessary to recommend exclusion of 99 children from school due to the following conditions; temperature 99.6 or over, colds, coughs, sore throats, symptoms of communicable diseases, gastro-intestinal disturbances, skin diseases and parasites, swollen glands, discharging eyes, discharging ears. May I urge all parents to keep their children at home in bed if any of the above conditions occur. In this way each parent not only protects the health of his child, but aids in safe-guarding the health of the entire school.

Physical health examinations were given by the School Physician. Weighing and measuring of children has been carried as usual. Vision testing has been done in all grades. Children above the third grade received the Audiometer hearing test.

The Dental Clinic under the auspices of the Sudbury Dental Group has been held on Tuesday mornings at the Center School. In January 215 children in the elementary grades were given dental examinations and in September, 234 children received dental examinations. 31 sessions for treatments have been held. An average of 10 operations, consisting of fillings, extractions and cleanings have been done each morning.

Diphtheria immunization clinic was held at the Center School. The Schick test was given to 4 pre-school and 31 school children to determine whether or not the previous diphtheria inoculations had become effective. 8 infants, 7 preschool and 18 school children were immunized.

338 home visits have been made to (1) interpret findings of health examinations or inspections and to show the relationship between the child's school attendance, his class work, and his health, (2) emphasize the need and plan for adequate medical and dental care, (3) check absence.
