DPW and Police Department Help Get the Kids Home!

I want to recognize the incredible job performed by the Town's Public Works and



Police Departments during that mid-day storm with white out conditions on Friday, December 9th. This storm produced incredible challenges for the school bus drivers, who needed a lot of help and cooperation from the DPW and the Police Departments to get all the school children home safely. As the weather deteriorated, an increasing number of buses became stuck, some repeatedly, and required Public Works equipment

and manpower to get them going again. Police Chief Fadgen put out extra officers to assist as well, and they were able to escort some children home when the buses just weren't going to be able to make it

on some of the more challenging roads in Town. The need to get the school buses moving pulled the DPW crews off the primary and secondary roads, leading to

delays in getting those roads plowed and treated and creating a very long day into a very long night for our employees. Thanks to everyone who worked so hard, keeping the public, especially the children, safe ed at all times

and protected at all times.

Capital Projects Report



Fire Chief Ken MacLean reports that the new bucket truck, known as F8, was delivered last week to the Sudbury Fire Department. Funds for this vehicle were approved through the Capital Budget by the 2004 and 2005 (Article 11) Town Meeting. The Chief reports that work still needs to be done on it before it is ready for operational use, as the radio and other equipment have to be transferred from the old bucket truck, and the Town's seal and lettering are still to be applied. Station 3 will be permanent base for F8. This vehicle is used to maintain the alarm system throughout the Town. The old bucket truck was not safe any longer for working on utility poles on busy roads, and was requiring expensive repairs to keep it at operational readiness. The old bucket truck will go down to the Public Works Department, who will try to get a few more years of useful life out of it.

All Terrain Vehicle Arrives

I had mentioned a few weeks ago that the Town received Homeland Security funds to purchase an all terrain vehicle for response to calls from off roads areas within Town. Chief MacLean reports that the Polaris ATV has arrived and is at Station 3. It is on a trailer and will be stored that way to allow for fast deployment. As an example of the need for such equipment, last week in Concord a woman called for



assistance while out cross country skiing in one of Concord's conservation area, and she was brought out using the Concord Fire Department's ATV. Sudbury is fortunate to have many acres of undeveloped land where the public can go hiking or cross country skiing, so it is important we have the right equipment to reach all areas of the Town should the need arrive.

Senior Center News

Thanks to Kris Kiesel and the Sudbury Council on Aging for inviting me to join them at their Holiday lunch and show last Wednesday. What a treat! Over 140 Sudbury seniors enjoyed a lovely lunch and were provided with great entertainment from the Sudbury Strutters and Tappers, with music to dine by from Janet Alford and Frank Frisselle. The Senior Center is always such a "happening" place. They are now offering a new game/activity called Pickle Ball. Pickle-ball is an import from Florida, where it is the latest word in active fun. The game uses light-weight wood paddles and a plastic perforated ball for a tennis or badminton-like game with an emphasis on coordination, patience, and strategy rather than strength or brute power. Played on a smaller court than tennis, Pickle-ball can be played in a singles or doubles format, using a low net. Points are scored on volleys only, and like ping-pong, can be learned quickly and has a lot of action. It is an aerobic activity, and a perfect way to tackle the post-holiday waistline. If you want to learn more, the Senior Center will offer Pickle-ball on Thursday afternoons, beginning January 19, from 12:30-3:00 in the Fairbank gym. Council on Aging President Joe Bausk will be on hand to help people learn the simple rules.
