Message from the Town Manager

Greetings!

It's hard to believe summer is done and kids are back in school. I hope everyone found time to relax and spend time with their families and recharge their batteries.

This week a Special Town Meeting was held at the L-S auditorium (see voting results provided by the Town Clerk at the end of this newsletter). I want to recognize and thank the staff of my office, the Law Office, the Technology Office and the Town Clerk's Office, who handle the many administrative tasks needed to make sure that Town Meeting goes smoothly and the Town Moderator is ably supported as he conducts the meeting. 752 registered voters attended the one night Special Town Meeting, and I thank them for their willingness to attend to the Town's business, vote thoughtfully, and stay until the last item was dispensed with at 11:07 pm. I want to briefly mention two articles which were approved. First, voters appropriated funds and authorized the issuance of debt for repair of the Nixon school roof, allowing this project to go forward, and keeping Sudbury eligible for a 36.89% grant from the Massachusetts School Building Authority toward the costs of the project. Approval from Sudbury voters at a Special Town Election, scheduled for December 4, 2012, will also be necessary. Second, voters approved a petition article to ask the State legislature to amend Chapter 131 of the Acts of 1994, which is our Town Charter, by increasing the Board of Selectmen from 3 members to 5 members. At their regular meeting on October 2, the Board of Selectmen will sign the formal petition document and then send it to our State Representative Tom Conroy to begin the legislative process required for enactment of a Special Act. Regarding article 3, a request for funds to replace and repair sections of the roof on the Fairbank Community center, a majority of voters approved the project, but unfortunately it was not a 2/3 majority, which is the requirement for authorizing bond issuance for capital projects. This roof has passed its expected useful life and the consulting firm of Russo Barr Associates, hired by the Permanent Building Committee, has recommended this project. Work will need to be undertaken to address the questions raised at Town Meeting about the future configuration and design of the Fairbank Community Center very soon so that we can resolve the issues related to this roof.

On Tuesday September 11, I joined with others at Sudbury's September 11 Memorial Garden in Heritage Park for the annual ceremony to remember the Sudbury victims of the 9/11 terrorist attacks: Geoffrey Cloud, Cora Hidalgo Holland and Peter Morgan Goodrich.

The ceremony included police and fire honor guards, and they presented the colors and raised the flag. My thanks to Lt. Scott Nix, and Detectives Wayne Shurling and Michael Curran of the Sudbury Police Department and Chief William Miles, Captain Tim Choate, and Firefighter Mike Matros of the Sudbury Fire Department, for their assistance at this event, and to Town Historian Lee Swanson for tolling the bells of First Parish at 8:46, the moment the first plane hit the World Trade Center After the bells tolled, I could hear sirens in the distance as Sudbury public safety staff responded to a call for service, and I could not help thinking of the brave New York Firefighters and Police Officers who responded to the World Trade Center buildings that morning 11 years ago.

I am grateful to the members of the September 11 Memorial Oversight Committee, including Chairman Beth Farrell and members Barbara Clifton, Bette Cloud, Rachel Goodrich, Deborah Kruskal, Kathy Newman, Kirsten Roopenian, and Larry O'Brien, for the care they take of the memorial and their planning for the annual event of remembrance. The Sudbury Public Works Department works with them as well. If you have not visited the September 11 Memorial in Heritage Park, I urge you to plan some time to visit this stunning landmark, which is designed to be a peaceful and beautiful place where town residents can reflect on the impact that solemn September day had on our nation and our community of Sudbury.

From the Selectmen's office

The Board continued their due diligence process in examining potential re-use of the Melone Gravel pit property so that all future deliberations are conducted with as much information as possible. The Melone parcel is a 46.6 acre property off North Road owned by the Town. As most of the gravel has been removed from this site, the Town has begun researching options for redevelopment of the property. In January 2011 the Town received the results of the first of two studies of the land from consultants. The first study examined potential municipal uses of the property, focusing on creation of recreational fields, a multi-family housing development, or low impact usage such as trails and open space. This second consultant's report focused on non-municipal, commercial options for the site and identified scenarios that would involve the Town leasing or selling the land to a commercial developer for development. The consultants were asked to provide a range of property values for each potential use and expected revenue that could be generated if the Town sold the property for that use. The study did not address ongoing fiscal costs and benefits of any of the scenarios, nor did it make a recommendation to the Board of Selectmen except to note that the land could also be banked at this time as values could change in the future. It only provided valuation information to add to fuller knowledge for the Board and the Town to consider as study of this parcel continues. Both of these reports are on the Town's web site. Town staff noted a list of "next steps" that should be undertaken if the Board wants to continue the process of studying alternatives for the Melone property.

The Board also considered a site plan request to modify the existing site plan for the Rugged Bear Plaza so that a restaurant could become an allowed use in the plaza. Members of the Board unanimously agreed with this proposal.

In other items, the Board voted to approve the request of Director of Planning and Community Development Jody Kablack to develop a grant request for funds to construct the proposed Town Center intersection improvements, accepted a \$2,170 grant to the Senior Center, accept a gift of \$10,000 from TD Bank for Rte. 20 traffic improvements, renewed the Sunday Entertainment license for Bullfinches restaurant, and congratulated new Eagle Scouts Dylan W and Taylor J. Finance Department

The Finance Department will be issuing the Town's FY13 Consolidated Budget document in the first week of October. An electronic version of the document will be posted on the Town's website. In addition, hardcopies will be distributed to the Board of Selectmen, Finance Committee and various staff members of the Town, SPS and Lincoln-Sudbury district. The document contains over 200 pages of financial exhibits, analysis and narratives pertaining to our current fiscal year's budget and financial plan.

The Town received notification today from the Department of Revenue regarding Free Cash. The amount of available funds or "free cash" as of July 1, 2012 for the Town of Sudbury's General Fund is \$2,388,556 or approximately 3% of the FY13 budget. Under ideal financial conditions, a community strives to generate free cash in an amount equal to 3-to-5 percent of its annual budget. Free cash is a revenue source which results from the calculation, as of July 1, of a community's remaining, unrestricted funds from operations of the previous fiscal year based on the balance sheet as of June 30. The DOR recommends that communities understand the role free cash plays in sustaining a strong credit rating and encourages the adoption of policies on its use. They also recommend that free cash not be available to supplement current year departmental operations.

Board of Health

The Board of Health inspected the five Sudbury Public Schools cafeterias on September 5-10, 2012. A new contracted food service company, Whitsons, is preparing food in all five schools. The inspections were satisfactory and a very good well-balanced nutritional lunch program including greater use of fresh vegetables and fruits is being offered by Whitsons for this school year. Department of Public Works

All streets that were submitted under Chapter 90 have been resurfaced and line striped. Drainage has been completed on Walkup Road and August Road.

Flash boards in the Carding Mill Dam were replaced. Two headwalls at the Old Lancaster Road Culvert were built. In addition, the Department finished repairing the Hudson Road Walkway from Teakettle Lane to Fairbank Road.

Public Safety

Fire Department

During the Town Meeting held in May of 2011, funds were approved to replace the fire alarm system at the Nixon School. The system in place at the time was 10 years old and deficient in a few areas. Approximately one third of the classrooms were not equipped with smoke detectors. Also, the equipment lacked addressability to inform responding firefighters of the location of the alarm. Modern fire alarm systems are fully addressable, meaning the system is configured to display the exact location and type of device that was tripped.

Under the direction of Sudbury Schools Maintenance Director Joe Kupczewski and Assistant Fire Chief John Whalen, the installation and acceptance testing on the new system was completed near the end of August, 2012. With the new equipment in place, firefighters are now informed of the specific location of the alarm on the new annunciator panel and accompanying map just inside the front door. In addition, all areas of the schools are protected, including two addressable smoke detectors in each classroom.

Nixon was the last school in Sudbury to be upgraded to a fully addressable fire alarm system. With this important improvement in place, the Town has taken yet another step to maintain safety in their school buildings. Along with the Sudbury Schools, the Fire Department appreciates the support of the Town's citizens with this important project.

If you are not yet a registered voter in the Town of Sudbury or wish to change your voter registration, the last day to register to vote or to make changes for the State Election on Tuesday, November 6, 2012 is *Wednesday, October 17, 2012*.

A special voter registration session will be held at the Town Clerk's office, Town Hall, 322 Concord Road, Wednesday, October 17, 2012, 9:00 AM until 8:00 PM. Registration is also available at the Town Clerk's office, 322 Concord Road, Monday - Friday 9:00 AM until 5:00 PM. For residents who are unable to register in person, mail-in voter registration forms are available at the Goodnow Library, the Post Office on Boston Post Road and the Town Clerk's office at 322 Concord Road.

The Massachusetts Mail-In Voter Registration Form can be used to register to vote in Massachusetts, to update registration information due to a change of name, make a change of address, or to register with a political party. A printable mail-in voter registration form is now available. After filling out this form, you must print it, sign it and mail it to your local election official.
