FY07 Operating Budget Update – No Override!


It's done! The Finance Committee has voted an operating budget to present to Town Meeting for the upcoming fiscal year. In meeting with the Board of Selectmen on Tuesday, January 31, the Finance Committee explained that by working with the various cost centers both individually and collaboratively, they were able to arrive at a proposed FY07 budget plan that is balanced within available revenues. Further, this budget plan would enable the Town

Departments, the Sudbury Public Schools and the Lincoln-Sudbury Regional High School to have sufficient resources to be able to keep close to the level of services that is currently being provided in FY06. All parties have worked at an exhausting pace since the beginning of January, and needed to finish up their deliberations and votes by this week in order to put the budget article into the Town Meeting warrant.

The Finance Committee is hoping to host a Town Wide Forum on March 20 to explain the budget plan to residents. Details are still being worked out, but the general idea at this time is for something similar to the Budget Forum held last year, where residents had the opportunity to ask questions of the Finance Committee and Town and School leaders. I will give details about this when they become available.

Public Safety Departments Offer Assistance with Child Safety Seat Installation

The Sudbury Fire Department now offers, on a limited basis, child car seat inspection and installation by appointment. Parents and caregivers are invited to have their car seats installed or inspected and learn what makes for safe transport of children in automobiles. Last September three members of the Sudbury Fire Department attended a 40 hour Child Safety Seat class in Barnstable, conducted by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety. This class, produced by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, trains participants in the proper selection, sizing, and installation of child safety seats in motor vehicles. It may seem that 40 hours is a long time spent learning how to properly install a car seat, but learning the laws, vehicle types, seat types, and many variables that go into proper car seat selection for a nearly infinite variety of children left everyone aware of why this training is so important. Interested residents can call the Fire Department to set up an appointment to make sure you are correctly using the child safety seat for the children you are carrying in your vehicle.
