Town staff and committees are constantly working to improve the quality of life in Sudbury. This weekly email is designed to share information with Town staff and committee members about the many programs and efforts that are underway.

Building Walkways, Road Striping and Crosswalk Painting

The DPW has been busy this summer. A walkway on Concord Road between Thompson Drive and Lincoln Road is currently under construction in the hopes of

being ready for school opening. One of the most visible tasks of the DPW each year is to repaint the crosswalks and re-stripe the lines of all primary and secondary roads. Both of these tasks are critical for the safety of motorists and pedestrians in Sudbury, and we sure get plenty of resident complaints and questions if there are any delays. Funds for this work are put in the DPW's road work budget. DPW Director Bill Place contracts out for the road striping, it is done at night, and takes about a week (if weather cooperates). The stop lines at intersections and crosswalks are painted by DPW employees. At the request of the Selectmen, the DPW has been painting crosswalks near schools and high volume areas in bright blue, and Bill has purchased and installed additional pedestrian crossing signs at particularly dangerous intersections. These safety enhancements have added to the cost of these projects in recent years, and the Board, Bill and I are grateful to Town Meeting for supporting the DPW road work account funding.

Participants should call for an appointment, and bring a brown bag with all their medicine, vitamins, and supplements. What a great chance to clean out your medicine cabinet!"
