From the Selectmen's Office

October 6

Representatives from National Development were in attendance to introduce themselves and begin discussion of the Raytheon redevelopment project. Representatives of The Village at Sudbury Station development also attended and discussed the newly proposed 40B Housing development. The Board voted to extend the Means Tested Senior Citizen Property Tax Exemption. The Intermunicipal Agreement Between the Towns of Wayland and Sudbury for Septage Disposal Facility Disposition was also signed.

October 20

The Board discussed and expressed support for the purchase of a conservation restriction on Wayside Inn land with CPC funds. It was also voted to assign a lease for a cell tower at 275 Old Lancaster Road to Varsity Wireless Investors, LLC. There was further discussion of feedback to be submitted to MassHousing regarding the Sudbury Station Site Eligibility application.

October 29

An executive session was held to discuss a potential amendment to the 2007 Frost Farm House agreement.

November 3

The final <u>letter of response</u> regarding Sudbury Station was voted. The Board decided to check the references of two of the firms who provided responses to the Melone property environmental data review RFP. Selectmen Haarde was assigned to work on development agreement negotiations with National Development.

November 17

The Board voted the A.S.K. proclamation, which encourages parents to ask "is there an unlocked gun in your house," where their children will be playing. It was voted to award the contract for analysis of potential contamination at the Melone property to GeoInsight, Inc. A <u>presentation</u> and discussion of the Avalon Bay housing proposal took place

and it was voted to have a letter to Mass Housing drafted that would reflect the Town's feedback on the project. It was also voted to request an additional \$50,000 in CPC funds for further design of the Bruce Freeman Rail Trail. A donation of \$3,900 for an appraisal of the Loring Parsonage was accepted from the Historical Society.

November 30

Representatives of MassHousing met with the Board and staff to discuss the Village at Sudbury Station Site Eligibility letter sent by the Board.

December 1

The Tax Classification hearing was held and certification was voted. The <u>letter to MassHousing regarding Avalon Bay</u> was finalized. Recommendations for Town Hall were presented by the Town Hall Blue Ribbon Committee.

December 4

An executive session was held to discuss collective bargaining, release of a Town Counsel opinion and security matters.

December 15

License renewals were approved, in addition to a new Wine & Malt Package store called Craft Beer Cellar Sudbury. The Wayside Inn conservation restriction, Remote Participation Policy, Minuteman Regional High School and the Town's Facebook page were also discussed.

December 22

The Board met to call a Special Town Meeting on February 9, 2016 and entered executive session to discuss litigation matters.

Building Inspection Department

As we head into the winter months, it's interesting to look back to see how the harsh New England weather has affected the different types of building permits that were issued this year.

- 1) The Building Department issued an unusually high number of roofing permits this year that can be attributed to the heavy snowfall and ice dams that we had last winter as well as a hail storm that came through the area in August. Roof Permits issued in 2014 were 195 compared to 598 issued in 2015.
- We also saw numerous permit applications to repair/rebuild decks that were damaged from the added snow load caused from people clearing snow off their roofs.
- Another trend we saw was an increase in spray foam insulation in attics to prevent the formation of ice dams.

Let's hope for milder weather in 2016.

Conservation Department

The months of November and December have been very busy in the Conservation Department. As projects for home renovations and building have increased, so have the many requests the Conservation Department receives to determine whether work is being done in a Wetland area and how to proceed.

The Commission meetings have been very full with applications to conduct work in areas where the Commission has jurisdiction.

The Conservation Agent has conducted many site visits with residents, is working with many of the larger projects taking place in town, and continues to work towards developing a Land Stewardship initiative that improves our walking trails on Conservation Land.

The Agent and Commission have worked with SVT to open new trails in the Landham Brook Marsh, which officially opened Sunday, December 6 to a large turnout of citizens who took a tour of the newly blazed trails.

Fire Department

The Sudbury Fire Department put our new pumper into service last month. Engine 2 is equipped with a 1000 gallon water tank and a 1500 gallon per minute water pump. In addition, it carries a brand new set of "Jaws of Life" style vehicle extrication tools and other medical emergency equipment. Department wide training was performed to familiarize our personnel with the new vehicle's systems. Engine 2 is assigned to Station 2 in South Sudbury.





The funding for Engine 2 was voted at the May, 2014 Town Meeting and was followed by a successful ballot vote in June. Once again, we express our appreciation to the residents of Sudbury for their support in purchasing this new piece of emergency apparatus.

Firefighter/Paramedic Bill Francis has been appointed as the new Emergency Medical Services Coordinator here at the Sudbury Fire

Department. Bill's responsibilities include administering the medical training and continuing education, coordinating our Quality Assurance/Quality Improvement Program, coordinating with our Medical Director, and making sure our entire medical program operates under the parameters set forth by the State Office of Emergency Medical Services. Bill Francis will replace Shane Medeiros, who left us to take a position with the Newton Fire Department. Bill has done a fine job as a Firefighter/Paramedic and I look forward to him taking over as our EMS Coordinator.

As the winter season approaches, I would like to remind all residents to be sure their smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in place and have fresh batteries. If you have any questions about your detectors or their operation, please feel free to call us at 978-443-2239.

Board of Health

National Handwashing Awareness Month

Handwashing is the simplest way to protect yourself from germs that live on your hands from illnesses like Norovirus, flu and the common cold. You can get germs on your hands by simply touching a doorknob, pressing an elevator button, grabbing a pole on public transit or shaking hands. Once these germs are on your hands, touching your mouth or nose to eat, sneeze or cough can make you sick.

Decrease your risk of getting sick by:

- Taking the time to wash your hands correctly: just 20 seconds is all you need to prevent yourself from getting sick later.
- Rinsing your hands with water isn't enough to really get them clean you need to use soap.
- Scrub your palms, between your fingers, the backs of your hands and under your fingernails for at least 20 seconds.

- Dry your hands with a paper towel. Use the same paper towel to turn off the water and, if using the restroom, open the door.
- If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Alcohol-based sanitizers can quickly kill most of the germs on your hands, but they do not get rid of all types of germs.

Planning & Community Development

The Planning and Community Development Department said goodbye to Jim Kupfer, our Assistant Planner, in October. Jim is now the Town Planner in the Town of Bellingham. We wish him well in this new position, and have confidence he will be very successful in his new job.

The past 2 months have been largely spent working on the Raytheon Redevelopment project. There are several aspects to the redevelopment that are happening. Physical changes to the site will soon be seen. The site will be demolished in phases, with the first phase of demolition of the western-most group

of buildings happening in January 2016. The second demolition phase will occur in December 2016 with the easternmost buildings removed at that time. One small building on site will remain for 5-7 years, but is located in a remote corner of the property and will not interfere with the redevelopment. Permitting for the Whole Foods grocery store has begun, with special permits and site plan review on-going at the

Zoning Board and Planning Board. The preliminary 40B application process was also begun in November, and the Board of Selectmen sent a letter to the Massachusetts Housing Partnership in support of the Avalon Bay project, with conditions. The full 40B application is anticipated to be submitted to the Zoning Board in early January 2016. The Planning Board has also been reviewing

proposed zoning changes for the property, to be presented at the 2016 Annual Town Meeting. Much information is available on the Town's website at www.sudbury.ma.us. Check often as updates are added as we receive them.


The Planning and Community Development Department also recently reviewed the preliminary 40B application for the Village at Sudbury Station, off Concord Road behind the town cemetery. The Board of Selectmen sent a letter to MassHousing noting many serious concerns about the viability, safety and desirability of that development. The Village at Sudbury Station application materials and the

Town's letter to MassHousing can be found on the front page of the Town's website.

The Sudbury Center intersection improvement project is still ongoing, with all current activities being undertaken by the DPW Dept. The project will be fully completed in the spring. The Sudbury Center Improvement Advisory Committee will continue its review and refinement of the landscape plan over the

winter, and expects to continue implementation of the landscape plan in the spring.

The Town Hall Blue Ribbon Committee presented its preliminary report to the Selectmen on December 1, with the Committee recommending a restoration of the building to its original uses, including meeting room, community room, and space for exhibits that can



be used by the Sudbury Historical Society and other groups. The full report will be completed in the next few months.

The Sudbury Housing Trust's 3 unit affordable housing project at 278 Maynard Road is under construction, with a projected occupancy in the spring of 2016. A lottery was held on October 7, 2015 to, and 3 lucky households are waiting for their new homes to be completed.

The Planning Board held a Walkway Forum on October 14, 2015 to hear from interested residents. 7 neighborhoods presented preliminary petitions, however more work is needed to gain widespread acceptance by affected property owners. The Planning Board will continue to work with residents as petitions

are submitted. Funding for new walkways occurs at the Annual Town Meeting.

Northern Bank and Trust Company will be opening the Sudbury branch at 430 Boston Post Road this month. The North Ridge Farm 6 lot single family subdivision has 2 houses up for sale. Dudley Brook Preserve Senior Residential Community is nearing construction completion, which also included reconstruction of Tall Pine Drive.

Residents interested in any of these issues are welcome to attend the various meetings at which these projects are discussed. Check the <u>Town's website calendar</u> for a listing of meeting dates and times.

Transitioning to our new facility located at 75 Hudson Road began on Monday, December 7th. It was necessary to coordinate the transfer of the 911 equipment, radio systems, phone lines, CJIS connections as well as many other disciplines. Dispatch became operational at the new facility at approximately 5:00 PM on December 8th. The Wayland Police Department assisted with 911 calls transferred to their facility during the move; thank you Chief Irving and staff.

With work still being done, we are unpacking and adjusting, but it is well worth the effort. We are extremely grateful for the support of the residents who approved the project and who continue to support us during our move. The facility is much safer, more efficient and sustainable for decades to come.

Sometime in January, the Permanent Building Committee will be hosting a "Police Line Do Not Cross" tape cutting dedication ceremony on a day to be determined. As well, once we are completely settled and the weather clears, we will have an open house so residents will have the opportunity to tour our facility to get a true understanding of the operational capabilities. If you would like a tour prior to spring, please

contact me so we can arrange to do so. There is not always sufficient personnel in the building to conduct a tour.



Again, we would like to extend our sincere appreciation to all the residents, committees, town staff and contractors who made the building come to reality.

Town Clerk

Town Census

The 2016 Annual Town Census will be mailed to all residents in the second week in January. Residents should verify or correct all information, sign, and return the census within 10 days of receipt for processing by the Town Clerk's Office. The data from the census is used to compile the Sudbury voter list, Sudbury school planning, and other reports required by Massachusetts General Law, therefore all members of the household, aged three years and older, should be included. If a resident needs a replacement census form, or has any questions, please contact the Town Clerk's Office at 978-639-3351.

A completed census can be returned by mail or hand-delivered to drop-off boxes located outside the Town Clerk's Office (322 Concord Road) and the Flynn Building (278 Old Sudbury Road).

Failure to respond to the Annual Town Census will result in the removal from Sudbury's active voting list and removal from the resident list for any non-registered voters.

Dog Licensing

All dogs aged six months or older must be licensed each year. Applications for dog licensing can be found inside the census packet, at the Town Clerk's Office, or on our website. The dog licensing period extends from January 1 through March 31, 2015. Beginning April 1, a late penalty fee of \$25 will be assessed for each unlicensed dog, in addition to the regular licensing fee (Town Bylaw Article V, Section 3A.)

The Annual Town Election will be held on Monday, March 28, 2016.

Candidates' packets will be available beginning Monday, January 4, 2016. The deadline for filing Intentions to run for office is February 4th.
