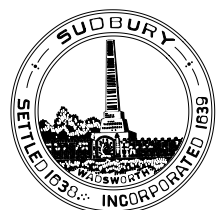
On January 2, we held a citizen-petition initiated Special Town Meeting. The one article which passed was a momentous one for Sudbury. Once state legislation approves the change, Sudbury's Board of Selectmen will be called the Select Board, and the Town Charter will be updated to inclusive, gender neutral language. The article was presented by the Board's three female members and passed nearly unanimously. It was a proud moment in Sudbury history, and I feel fortunate to have witnessed it.

Another exciting development which took place in January was the selection of Henry L. Hayes, Jr to be Sudbury's next Town Manager. Henry is currently the

Chief Master Sergeant at Hanscom Air Force base and will bring an abundance of leadership experience to the role. While specifics, including his start date, are still being worked out, we are all looking forward to welcoming Henry sometime this spring.

Be sure to mark your calendar for three important events in March. Tuesday, March 3 is the Presidential Primary, but if you can't make it to the polls that day, Early Voting and Absentee Voting are available. Saturday, March 28, starting at 10AM in L-SRHS auditorium, will be the Town Forum regarding the Fairbank Community Center. The Fairbank project which will be up for a vote later this year. And finally, Monday, March 30 is the Annual Town Election. Hope to see you there!

Building Department

The Building Department had a busy year in 2019 performing more than 4,200 plumbing, electrical and building inspections. We expect to have another busy year with The Coolidge phase 2 well under way. Coolidge phase 2 consists of 56 single bedroom apartments for seniors.

We have surpassed last year's permit applications for the month of January.

The new building at 415 Boston Post Road (the old Police station) is completed with Verizon, Goswick

Eye and The Nails, Spa and Beauty occupying the building.

Aubuchon Hardware is open at 505 Boston Post Road and Santander Bank has moved across the street to 526 Boston Post Road.

There are nine new single family homes currently under construction around town.

The Building Department has gone online!

You can now find the necessary forms and apply for permits with the Building Department online. The

Department of Conservation

The Conservation Department has been busy streamlining office procedures in order to make our permitting processes easier for residents to navigate. Our office files have been reorganized and consolidated to facilitate access to pertinent information for both applicants as well as the Commission, as they start developing their land management program. The office has also been working on developing an electronic filing system for new wetland applications.

The Conservation Commission has been carefully evaluating some larger projects that will have a greater impacts on the community at large, including Sudbury Valley Trustees Prescribed (controlled) Burn Plan for the Memorial Forest in the Hop Brook area, working in conjunction with the city of Marlborough and US Fish and Wildlife to reestablish a Pitch Pine – Scrub Oak Barrens, a nationally imperiled habitat, for multiple rare

species including the whip-poor-will, as well as a proposal from the Hop Brook Protection Association to manage water chestnut that are negatively impacting Stearns Mill, Carding Mill, and Grist Mill ponds. The Commission continues to work with Buddy Dog Humane Society to achieve their operation expansion project, along with several other projects for renovations, pools, decks, tree removals by homeowners, to ensure the Sudbury's wetlands are protected.

You may have noticed more wildlife out and about this time of year than usual, given the mild temperatures this season. Coyote have been seen in the area, one very brazen coyote seen relaxing under a residential rabbit hutch, raising concerns with some residents. Please continue to be aware of the wildlife that may enter your properties in search of food sources.

Teen Author Talk: Angela Howes

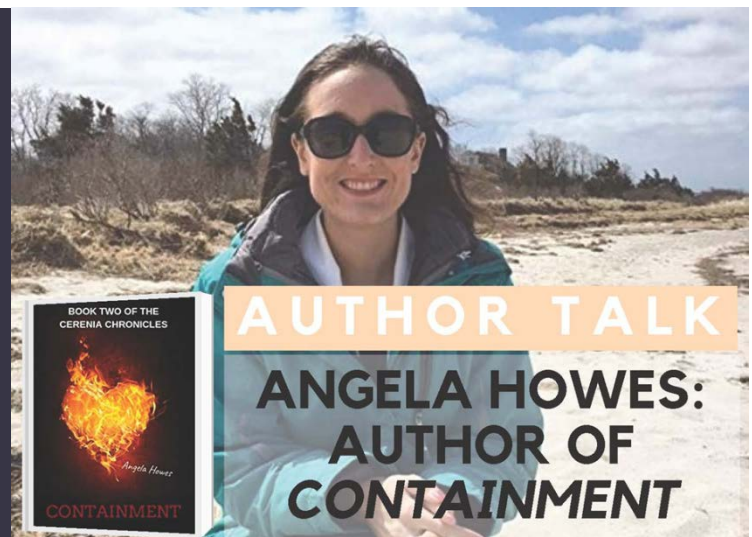

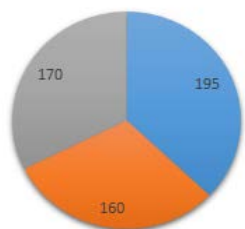

For eight years, the library has been offering extra space, extended hours and encouragement for L-S students studying for midterms and finals, and for the most part, it has been an outstanding experience. However, last June we experienced significant behavior problems including vandalism of the library. As a result, we implemented a number of changes for midterms this year. We asked students to check in upon arrival and gave out wrist bands so they could come and go without multiple sign ins. We reduced the extended hours from 11:00pm to 10:00pm. Most importantly, it gave us the opportunity to greet each student and explain our behavior expectations. These new precautions resulted in a much better experience for everyone. For finals in June, we may add back the hour from 10:00-11:00 under specific circumstances. We may add adult-monitored silent study areas. But we will need the community's help. Parent and adult volunteers are crucial to our

success. Please consider signing up for a time slot in June when we begin our preparations for finals.

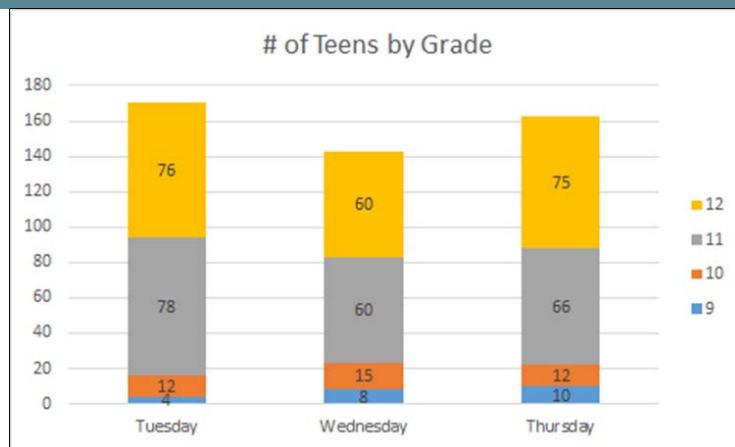
Children's Story Time at the Farmer's Market

Understanding Affordable Housing Options Seminar

While homelessness is decreasing across the country, the number of individuals experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity in the MetroWest area is increasing at a startling rate. In fact, Massachusetts has led the nation in the growth in homelessness, with a 45% spike in family homelessness since 2007. In response to the dramatic surge in clients who are either at risk of homelessness or experiencing homelessness, the Board of Health Social Work Office is presenting a seminar for MetroWest residents in need of housing or interested in learning more about affordable options, for those experiencing housing insecurity or at risk of eviction, as well as for the social service professionals who work with these individuals.

Operation Fast Vax

The Sudbury Health Department organized, hosted and planned a Critical Staff Infra Structure table top exercise on January 29th with over 50 participants from seven different towns. Planning and implementation for this important exercise started with review and revisions to our Emergency Dispensing Site (EDS) Plan. Our EDS would be activated in the event of pandemic flu to administer vaccine to the population of Sudbury. In conjunction with Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Coordinators, we evaluated our plan to secure procedures needed in emergency vaccine management and distribution. Our team in Sudbury included: Fire Chief John Whalen, Assistant Fire Chief Tim Choate, Police Chief Scott Nix, Health Department Director Bill Murphy and Phyllis Schilp, Public Health Nurse. During the drill, we were able to collaborate and develop the best plan for Sudbury. Many thanks to Bill Barletta and Larry Jodrey for their assistance with helping to organize this event.

Emergency Planning for the Winter Season

Now that winter is upon us we need to be ready for any weather emergency. The Sudbury Town Shelter is at the Fairbank Community Center. In the event of a shelter opening a reverse 911 call will go out to the town. Broadacres Farm Design Charrette Report

In November of 2019, on behalf of the Board of Selectmen for the Annual Town Forum, the Planning and Community Development Department and consultant Wright Ostermier Landscape Architects (WOLA) conducted a community design charrette for the Broadacres Farm property at 82 Morse Road to gather community ideas and advance planning for the recently

acquired 34-acre property. As a result of this Town Forum, WOLA developed the Broadacres Farm Design Charrette Report which summarizes the process, findings, and recommendations moving forward for the property based upon the feedback received at the design charrette. Draft Hazard Mitigation Plan Update Available for Review

The Town of Sudbury adopted its first Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP) in 2010, which was approved by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The Town's Local Hazard Mitigation Committee has been working with a consultant from the Horsley Witten Group to update the plan since May of 2019. The Town's draft HMP Update (link) is now available for review and comment. The plan identifies natural hazards affecting the Town such as floods, extreme weather, winter storms, and earthquakes, as well as actions the Town can take to reduce the impacts of these hazards. A public meeting on the HMP Update was held at Town Hall on January 29, 2020. Once a 30-day public comment period passes, the Committee and consultant will make final revisions, and the HMP Update will be sent to FEMA for review and approval. The HMP should ideally be updated every five years to allow the Town to remain eligible for FEMA funding for emergency responses.

Town Census

The Annual Town Census will be mailed to all households by January 1. Residents should verify or correct all information, sign, date and return the census for processing by the Town Clerk's Office. The data is used to compile the Sudbury voter list, Sudbury school planning, and other reports required by Massachusetts General Law, therefore all members of the household, aged three years and older, should be included. If a resident needs a replacement census form, or has any questions, please contact the Town Clerk's Office at 978-639-3351 or clerk@sudbury.ma.us.

The 2020 Federal Census will be mailed to all households in April. This is different from the Town census. It should be filled out and mailed to the Federal government.

Dog Licensing

Dogs aged six months or older must be licensed each year. Licensing applications can be found on our website, inside the census packet and at the Town Clerk's Office. The licensing

period extends from January 1 through March 31 each year. Beginning April 1, the late fee of \$25 will apply for each unlicensed dog in addition to the regular licensing fee (Town Bylaw Article V, Section 3A.)
