

As the impacts of COVID-19 touch our lives, we experience grief and trauma.

COVID-19 & Our Mental Health

As we continue to adapt to the impacts of COVID-19 in our local community and the world, together we are experiencing upheaval anything unlike we have experienced before. We are all experiencing grief and trauma as we adjust to losses big and small. From losses of freedom of movement, anticipated trips or plans, and family events, to losses of employment and income, we all have things big and small that we are grieving. In addition, many are experiencing anticipatory grief as they worry about illness or loss of loved ones, and grief when they see healthcare workers, responders, and others struggling on the news.

Understanding how grief and trauma can impact us and how we can help ourselves be more resilient as we cope during this time is incredibly important. Grief and trauma impact our brains and bodies in ways that can leave us more tired and make us feel like we cannot function at the same levels we normally do.

Symptoms of trauma can include decreased concentration, hopelessness, insomnia, feelings of numbness, loss of interest and motivation, irritability, anxiety, emotional overwhelm, nightmares, and physical aches and pains such as headaches.

The experience of grief, often described as a linear, phased

process, can actually be quite unpredictable as we move erratically among the phases including denial and isolation, anger, acceptance, bargaining, and depression, often revisiting phases repeatedly as we process our losses.

The most important thing you can do for yourself and for those around you is to be mindful that, during this time, being productive, creating and sticking with routines and engaging in activities you have once enjoyed, may be particularly challenging. This is very normal!

The best gift you can give yourself and those you love right now is to take care of yourself like you would a good friend. Be forgiving of yourself and allow yourself a lot of space to process everything you are experiencing. Some great self-care practices include:

- · getting regular exercise
- making a regular practice of meditation, yoga, prayer, or mindfulness
- maintaining a consistent sleep schedule
- · expressing gratitude
- spending time outside if it is safe to do so
- · eating well

- · maintaining a routine
- limiting your news and social media diet

Activities that can be restorative and invigorating include:

- · giving to your community
- planning regular social connections through online tools, letters, or phone calls
- indulging in enjoyable hobbies and creative activities
- learning a new skill

The most important thing you can do right now is to take the time to listen to your body and your heart, and treat yourself with kindness, patience and understanding. Motor Vehicle Excise Tax

Sudbury's Tax Office issued over 16,000 excise tax bills in February. As expected, the Assessing Department fielded many telephone calls, email inquiries, and abatement requests after the bills were issued. Many vehicle owners are not familiar with the provisions of auto excise abatements. This month's article is all about excise: the requirements to obtain abatements as well as some general information.

ABATEMENTS

During any given year, circumstances arise which, in some instances, cause vehicle owners to become eligible for motor vehicle excise tax abatement. A motor vehicle excise abatement may be in order if:

- There is an error in the valuation (see FAQ How is excise valuation determined?).
- The vehicle was sold or traded during the year in which it is being taxed, and the registration was properly cancelled or transferred to a subsequent vehicle.
- The vehicle was stolen and the appropriate cancellations and forms have been filed with the Police and Registry of Motor Vehicles.
- The owner moved from the Town another Sudbury to Massachusetts city or town, before January 1. There is no provision for abatement when moving from one municipality to another during the calendar year. Excise is paid to the municipality where the vehicle is garaged and registered from on January 1 of the calendar year. Unlike other fees and charges, base excise amounts do not vary from one municipality to another. Vehicle owners pay the same base excise regardless of which municipality collects the tax.
- The owner moved to another state and cancelled the registration in

Massachusetts. In order to meet the criteria for abatement, the MA registration must be cancelled and the vehicle must be registered in the subsequent state. Moving out of state is not in itself a reason for abatement.

 A vehicle lease ends and the registration has been cancelled or transferred to another vehicle. In the case of a leased vehicle, the leasing company typically applies for the abatement.

EXCISE TAX GENERAL INFORMATION AND FAQ'S

Chapter 60A of Massachusetts General Laws imposes an excise on the privilege of registering a motor vehicle or a trailer in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The excise is levied annually in lieu of a tangible personal property tax.

The excise is levied by the municipality where the vehicle is principally garaged. The revenue becomes part of the local community treasury.

Where does billing data come from?

The Registry of Motor Vehicles prepares data for excise bills according to the information on the motor vehicle registration and sends it to cities and towns. Municipalities then prepare bills based on excise data sent by the Registry in conformity with Department of Revenue requirements.

How is excise valuation determined?

Valuations are based on the manufacturers' list prices for vehicles in their vear of manufacture. Present market value, price paid, and condition are not considered in the valuation process. The excise tax law (M.G.L. c.60A, s.1) establishes the formula for valuation for state tax purposes whereby only the manufacturer's list price and the age of the motor vehicle are considered. Various percentages of the manufacturer's list price are applied. The percentages are as follows:

 Year preceding the designated year of manufacture (brand new car released before model year): 50%

• Year of manufacture: 90%

Second year: 60%Third year: 40%

• Fourth year: 25%

• Fifth & succeeding years: 10%

How is excise tax calculated? Once the value of the vehicle is established, the excise rate of \$25.00 per thousand is applied to the valuation. Excise tax is assessed annually on a calendar vear basis. If the motor vehicle is registered after January 31, it is taxed for the period extending from the first day of the month in which it is registered to the end of the calendar year. For example, if a vehicle is first registered on April 30, it will be taxable as of April 1, for nine months of the year (April through December) and the excise due; therefore, will be 9/12 of the full excise. In no event shall the excise be assessed for less than \$5.00. nor shall an abatement or refund under Section 1 of Chapter 60A reduce an excise to less than \$5.00

Who collects the motor vehicle excise?

Local tax collectors are responsible for collecting the motor vehicle and trailer excise. Taxpayers should be prepared to pay the full amount due as there are no special considerations for financial hardship.

How do I change my address for excise tax?

The Mass Registry of Motor Vehicles now hosts an Online Service Center. Address changes and corrections, as well as many other transactions can be managed online at the myRMV Online Service Center.

How do I cancel a registration?

There is no longer a need to return license plates to the Registry. Registrations are easily cancelled online at the myRMV Online Service Center.

How do I file an Excise Abatement?

Wind & Rain Storm on April 13

High winds brought down multiple trees and large limbs throughout Town as a result of the storm on Monday, April 13, 2020. The Public Works Department responded to over 35 calls that afternoon and into the night-time hours. Many limbs and trees were blocking roadways, hanging in electrical wires or falling on cars. The Public Works crew worked tirelessly to clear the roadways and remove fallen limbs and debris to ensure the safety of the residents.

Mount Pleasant Cemetery Stone Wall

The Public Works Department recently took on the task of constructing a new stone wall adjacent to the Veteran's section of the Mount Pleasant Cemetery. This new wall replaced an old, unsightly wall made from recycled granite curbing. The project undertaken by the Cemetery Division with guidance and expertise from internal masonry craftsman. Thank you to the Public Works team entire team for the beautifully crafted stone wall and surrounding landscaping to pay proper respect to the Veterans section of the Mount Pleasant Cemetery.



New Fuel Island

The new above-ground fuel island at the Public Works Facility is substantially complete with only minor landscaping and punch list remaining. management and dispensing system is fully operational and is a welcome upgrade from the aged, underground system it replaced. Upon start-up of the new aboveground fuel island, the old fuel island canopy was demolished, the underground tanks were removed, and the soils around the tanks were sampled. No environmental issues were identified during the removal of the tanks. The project is a success.

Roadway Resurfacing

The 2020 Pavement Management Program is well underway. This year, DPW was able to take advantage of reduced vehicular traffic (resulting from school closure and the stay-at-home order in place due to COVID-19) to begin roadwork earlier than past years. The program uses industry-leading methods to assure the work is completed as efficiently as possible and that the road surface improvements last for many years.

 Design Update

Although Town buildings are closed to the public, the Planning and Community Development Department continues to be busy processing development permit applications: responding inquiries from residents. businesses. developers. and property owners; and continues to staff numerous Town boards. committees, and commissions so they are able to continue to conduct their business. Current project highlights are as follows:

Cold Brook Crossing Residential Development

Formerly known as the Quarry North or Melone property at 16 & 36 North Road/Route 117, the Cold Brook Crossina residential development began its permitting process with the Planning Board on April 8, 2020 at a joint meeting with the Design Review Board. The 274 unit proposed project would contain 81 age restricted units and 26 affordable units in townhouses and multi-family buildings approximately 26 acres of land with associated parking, amenities, and infrastructure. Peer reviews of the project's stormwater management system and traffic analysis are currently underway. Please see the Cold Brook Crossing Development page for more information.

Master Plan Update

On April 17, 2020, the Master Plan Steering Committee held their last of a series of brainstorming meetings which had focused on four critical topics which will lay the foundation for the goals, objectives, and recommendations for the updated Master Plan document. The Town's project consultant, the Horsley Witten Group, will now be writing the action items section of the Master Plan. Upon completion of a draft of this section of the plan, Master Plan Committee, Town staff, and the consultant team will present this section to the public for further refinement. Subsequent to this public review, the last section of the Master implementation, would developed with a targeted goal of having the entire updated Master Plan document approved by the Planning Board in June or July of 2020.

Microtransit Pilot Initiative

The Transportation Committee remains hard at work fine tuning the details to implement a pilot program that would provide door-to-door transportation services for seniors, people with disabilities, financially vulnerable residents, and veterans - connecting them to health and other local services as well as employment opportunities. Through this transportation pilot. funded by a state Community Compact grant, the Transportation Committee aims to learn more about the needs of these vulnerable populations and what demand may exist for additional local and regional transportation services. While a launch date has not yet been established, it is hoped the pilot program can begin in the next few months.

Bruce Freeman Rail Trail Design Update

We realize people are using public lands and trails more than ever during these challenging times and look forward to the Sudbury Bruce Freeman Rail Trail (BFRT) advancing to construction in the coming years. The Town is working diligently to advance to the 75% design phase of the BFRT from the Concord Town line to near Station Avenue off Union Avenue. The path design, as well as the structural (bridges and boardwalk) design, required at the 25% design stage have been submitted and reviewed by MassDOT. The Town, the design consultants, and MassDOT working are to resolve collaboratively MassDOT comments that have been made and hope to schedule the Design Public Hearing in the coming months.

MassDOT and the **Boston** Metropolitan Organization (MPO) continue to support the project for construction funding in Federal fiscal year 2022, and have endorsed the 2021-2025 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) which covers an increase in the BFRT construction estimate associated with changes to the boardwalk design.
